T & P Ry. Consolidate **Divisions**

Elimination of one of the three divisions of the Texas and Pacific Railroad and establishment of the operations headquarters of two divisions at Fort Worth were announced Wednesday by A. L. Chester, vice president fo th road with officers in Dallas.

Chester said, effective Aug 1 the T & P would have two divisions, the western and eastern, and the superintendents of both would be located in Fort Worth. Heretofore the road has had three divisions, the Fort Worth, with headquarters there the Rio Grande, with headquarters at Big Spring, and the Lousiana, with headquarters at Alexandria.

L. L. Oliver, former superintendent of the Fort Worth division, will be in charge of the new western division, which includes Fort Worth and all territ-

J. G. Brannon, former superintendent of the Lousiana division will be in charge of the eastern division, including all territory north and east of Fort

A. E. Pistole former superintendent of the Big Spring division will be assigned as a special representative of the road offices in Dallas.

Division forces will be adjusted in line with the above changes J. E. Friend, master mechanico at Big Spring, has gone to Fort Worth as master mechanic of the Western division, and the gen eral roadmaster (track department) of the Rio Grande division L. R. Stevens has gone to Fort Worth as general roadmaster of the Western division.

H. C. Vinsant, located at Fort Worth as master mechanic of the Fort Worth division, will be trans ferred to Marshall as road master of the Eastern division. F. R. Brief History Of Editors Of Callahan County

The people of Callahan County appreciate the Newspapers of Cal lahan County, as they have done much to help develop the County and as the Old Settlers are to hold their Reunion at Clyde, Aug 9, I feel it is well to let the people know something of the Editors of these papers.

THE BAIRD STAR was established in Baird, Texas, where the first issue was gotten out December 8, 1887. The Editor sorr6y to 6have them leave. then being W. E. Gilliland, who was then a young man, who mar ried Dicie Windham, the youngest daughter of Dr. and Mrs. J. D. Windham, she being a sister of Tom Windham, now President of The First National Bank of Baird the County.

Miss Eliza Gilliland now Editor of The Baird Star was born September 5. 1875, in a newly built log cabin on the banks of Hog Creek in Brown County, which is not on the site of the Brownwood lake. Her education was obtained in the country schools until her father moved with his family to Baird and opened The Baird Star, then she entered the Baird Schools, and also helped her father in the afternoons and Saturdays with the paper, where she really gained most of her education and experience in the work that has so timely fitted her for the position she now holds. Her father passed away in January, 1929, and soon after, her mother, when she became sole owner of the paper. She is ably assisted by her brother, Haynie Gilliland, who assists her in publishing The Baird Star. He is manager of the job department and foreman of the mechanical department. She is also taking a great interest in the Old Settlers Reunion, and acts as registor, she has almost a complete list of names of all the pld steelers.

THE CROSS PLAINS REVIEW is under the direction of Jack "Leto's" for the Gums Scott, whose father was the late George B. Scott, who married a C. Cutbirth.

Mr Butler was born in Kentucky and came to Texas in 1882 with his parents, who settled in Dallas County, where he attended the Public Schools of Dallas county. he then attended Burleson College at Greenville and Baylor Univcersity of Waco. Before coming to Clyde he worked on the Bridge port Times of Bridgeport Texas for several years, where he advanced to Editor. Besides being editor and doing job printing he has been on Clyde School Board for about twenty years, 12 years of this time he served as Secretary of the Board. He has also been a Deacon in the Baptist

Church for over 25 years. Mr. Butler's first job in Callahan County was working for J. C. Freeman, about 1 mile south of Dressy, where he grubbed out
