



Many kept up with her for the rest of her life, feeling in their hearts that she was partly their mom too. Many projects were made easier because of her shouldering more than her share of the load.

Not only does her family mourn her but her church and her town will also feel the loss of this strong, independent, caring, small town lady who always tried to do a bit more than her share.

commercial pesticide applicators.
