NEW POLLUTION CONTROL MEASURE ADDED

According to David Seitz of the Soil Conservation Service, "A new agricultural pollution control measure has been added to the Great Plains Conservation Program. It's holding ponds and tanks, the eighth in a series of practices eligible for cost-sharing that are designed for pollution abatement or control.

When the Great Plains Program was extended by Congress for another 10 years, changes that would broaden its environmental effectiveness were authorized. Nearly 30 practices have now been added or changed to reflect the new emphasis on environment, fish and wildlife habitat, recreation, and the economic use of land."

J. C. RANDEL RETIRING JULY 1 AS WTU DISTRICT MANAGER

J. C. Randel, district manager of West Texas Utilities Company's Panhandle District for the past nine years, will retire July 1, and is taking his vacation during the month of June.

With Randel's retirement, A. D. Green, assistant district manager of the Panhandle District since March, will be promoted to district manager. Green will act as district manager during Randel's vacation.

The announcement was made today by Vice President Durwood Chalker of Abilene.

RANDEL JOINED WTU IN 1928
J. C. Randel will retire with more than 43 years of active service with West Texas Utilities Company.

His long service with the company began in 1928 when he was employed as a salesman in the Hamlin Local Office. In 1932, he was made cashier-bookkeeper in Hamlin and one year later, he was transferred to Quanah and promoted to billing clerk.

Shortly after that, Randel was promoted to chief clerk for the Quanah District, a position he held until 1949 when he was transferred to Vernon as assistant district manager. Seven years later, he was transferred back to Quanah as district manager.

Then, in 1962, when the Quanah and Childress Districts were combined, Randel was transferred to Childress as district manager of the new Panhandle District.

Randel was born in Anson in 1906 and attended the public schools in Hamlin. After his graduation from Hamlin High School, he attended Texas Tech in Lubbock.

Mrs. Randel is the former Ruby Lloyd Johnson. They were married in Merkel in 1932.

During his nine years in Childress, Randel has been active in civic activities. He has served on the board of directors of the Childress County Hospital, as a director of the Childress Chamber of Commerce, as president of the Childress Industrial Foundation, on a commission for Area Wide Comprehensive Health Planning in the North Texas Region and as a member of the board of directors of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce for the past seven years.

Adult Welding Course Held

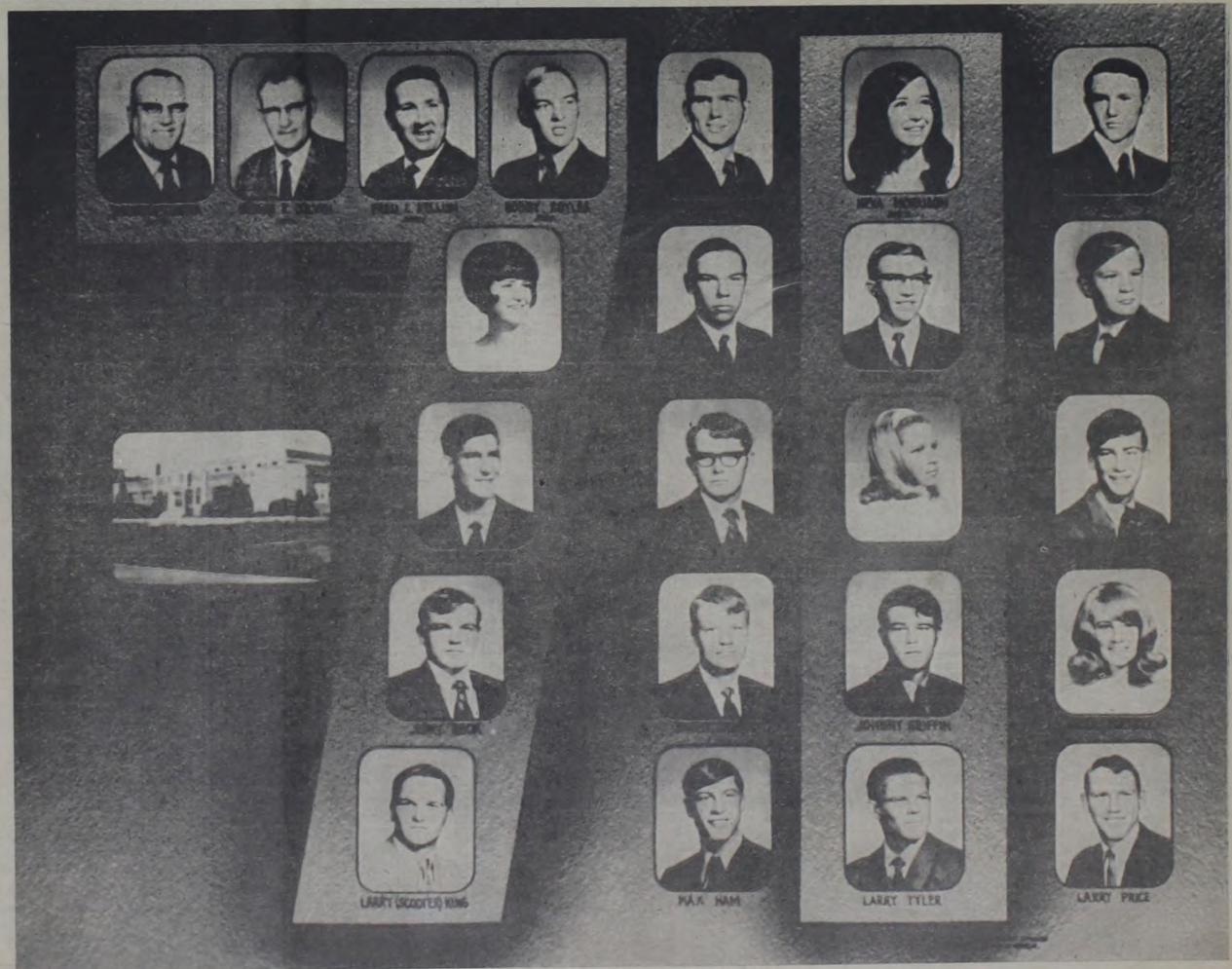
