These machines have limited speed and maneuverability Tractors and self propelled machines generally can travel no faster than 25 per hour Machines with this speed limitation are identified to motorists on the road with a Slow Moving Vehicle (SMV) emblem. The SMV emblem has a central fluorescent orange triangle. The orange triangle is bordered by red Be alert roreflective tape.
Be alert and watchful when traveling down our highways and farm to market roads. Remember arm machinery is slow and difficult to maneuver Also, when walking be sure to face traffic so you

Yeary, who carried the ball only eightSenior tailback Derrick Cruse matched Yeary's three touchdowns while chipping in 108 yards rushing and 50 yards receiving. Senior quarterback Justin Wiks threw a 20 yard pass to Douglas Payne for the additional Patriot touchdown.
Wilks completed three of six passes for 70 yards to move Valley's total yardage to 357 for the game compared to 101 yards for Meadow
Cruse recorded nine tackles while Robert Mendoza, Adam Ortiz, and Wilks each tallied eight. Albert Espinoza had seven tackles, while Senior nose guard Manuel Chavez recorded 6 tackles and ecovered a fumble.
Ramiro, Frank, and JC did a nice job upfront to open up holes
Clif Yeary started the scoring for the Patriots when he ran 65 yards only 64 seconds into the game. The first touchdown was followed by a safety after the Patriots forced an attempted punt that sailed ver the punter's head and into the end zone.
Yeary scored again with $5: 37$ left in the first quarter this time from four yards out. Wilks hit Payne for the 20 yards aerial touchdown and Cruse scored on a one yard plunge to make the first quarter score 28 - 0 in favor of Valley.

It appears that the same can be said about the U.S. negotiating position at the recently opened agricultural trade talks in Geneva, Switzer land. The U.S. position is being called the "Swiss formula" for reducing tar iffs and boils down to a requirement that countries with the highest tar iffs would have to make the steepest cuts to achieve an average tariff rate
of 25 percent on agricultural products. Even though the new U.S. position is not nearly as strong as the line

That "linear" approach also effectively locked in the advantageous trade
policies of other countries over the U.S By requiring the sere policies of other countries over the U.S. By requiring the same percentage
cuts to considerably lower U.S. tariff rates.
 U.S. position advocating an average tariff rate target of 25 percent for all countries has met with such resistance. Those countries that hold the
advantage under the current system would be the ones to make the most advantage under the current system would be the ones to make the most
significant changes under the "Swiss formula" advocated by the U.S. There is a long way to go before the agricultural trade talks are completed, but it is nice to know that our negotiators are, for the moment,
