Hall Commissioners **Declare Disaster State**

The Hall County Commissioners Court at Monday's regular monthly meeting continued discussions of erosion damages to the county roads from unusually heavy rains early this month resulting in a Commissioners Court Order declaring a local state of disaster for Hall County.

The proclamation states that a state of disaster for the County of Hall, resulting from thunder storms with damaging hail, high winds, a tornado, unusually heavy rain and flooding, is declared.

This state of disaster pro-claimed for the County of Hall by the County Judge on June 6, 1995, shall continue until terminated by order of the Commissioners Court and shall take effect immediately from and after its passage and publication the proclamation states.

Commissioners report county dirt roads are washed out in many places and are unpassable except with the use of fourwheel vehicles. Bridges have been washed out across some creeks, so county officials along with officials in neighboring counties, are seeking disaster assistance from state and fed-

Cities Will **Get Grant**

The City of Quitaque was notified by Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission that funding has been provided for a wood chipper to be used by the communities of Silverton, Quitaque and Turkey.

This grant was given to the three cities based on the recommendation of a TNRCC grant support up to \$23,000. Funding for this grant is made available through the "Don't Bag It" and on site composting programs that help recycle materials such missi as tree limbs to keep this material out of landfills.

This chipper will not only provide a means to dispose of limbs but will also turn it into a usable product that can be used in City Parks or in customers gardens or flowerbeds. The chipper to be purchased will handle limbs up to twelve inches in diameter.

Professors Receive Emeritus Titles

Five WTAMU professors received Professor Emeritus titles approved by the Board of Regents. Dr. Derl L. Brooks, Dr. Duane F. Guy, Dr. Charles "Bud" R. Townsend, Dr. Leonard W. Wilson and Clark E. Wooldridge.

Dr. Townsend, professor of history was in service to West Texas from 1967 through 1994, having published several books. including San antonio Rose: The Life and Music of Bob Wills. He received a Grammy award in 1975 from the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences and a Wrangler Award from the National Cowboy Hall of Fame. He also has received outstanding professor recognition from Mortar Board, the College of Education and Social Sciences, Leadership Board, Residence Hall Association and the Alumni Association and was the Faculty Excellence Award recipient in 1986.

West Texas A&M University initiated its Professors Emeriti program in 1992. Since then, once Professor Emeritus titles have been conferred upon 41 former faculty members (not including the 1995 class).

"Conferring Professor Emeritus titles is a very solemn experience for me," WTAMU President Russell C. Long, who came to WTAMU in 1992, said. There is such a sense of history, dedication and commitment This year is particularly special because I had the privilege of working, if even for a short while, with these five outstanding

gentlemen. Retired faculty with at least 10 years of full-time service to West Texas A&M University are eligible for nomination by current WTAMU faculty and administrators with faculty rank The prime selection criterion for awarding the title is " a significant contribution through long and distinguished service to the University in administration, teaching, research and professional service.

For-profit or commercial businesses such as garages and lube shops are restricted from bringing their oil and filters to the center and will have to continue disposing of their automotive waste according to their current disposal arrangements. Only used evaluation team with funding MOTOR OIL will be accepted, no transmission fluid or antifreeze will be accepted.

The oil recycling center for Quitaque was made possible by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and funded through a grant provided by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Com-

LETTER TO EDITOR

Dear Quitaque People, When I subscribed for the Quitaque paper about a year ago, I just wanted to see how many names I remembered that I would see. Quite a few, but so many new ones. So many of the places have been renamed, like the Caprock Cafe. Isn't that what used to be Kitchen's

I have just received the paper dated June 1, 1995. That's the one

that inspired me to speak.

"The story of the Doodlebug Train." I remember when the track between Quitaque and Turkey was being laid. We lived 1/2 mile north of the Kerr Hamilton place on part of the J. L. Bolton Ranch. In fact the RR was across part of the Bolton Ranch. That must have been in 1925 or '26. For we moved to Quitaque in early 1927.

My father worked on the tunnel

shown on page 6. I remember that well. We went up there once at plum picking time, to pick up a check and pick plums.

Down in the river one of our horses got in quick-sand. I was in the wagon along with Mama, sister and brother. I can still see that horse going down. My dad un-hitched the horse and cut the harness from the other one. I can't remember just how but he had the

freed horse pull the other one out. To this day anytime I'm in a car that's stuck in the mud, I can still see that horse in the quicksand.

Another story I remember while living in Quitaque: I learned to count early. So my dad thought I should go to school. He would start me and I'd be expelled, for two years before I was seven. One day I was going home early and saw my first football game. The grade school and high school was close together at that time. Lots of mountains and valleys and miles have been traveled but I'm still a fan of the Dallas

You can take the girl out of Texas (Quitaque) but not Texas or Quitaque out of this girl.



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
