Visiting Flomot Gin Is Time Of Laughter

 A city is defined by its Main Street. Yet deserted downtowns are becoming quite common.

Flomot located in northwest Motley County has its share of historical data. In the sparsely populated community today, it is hard to comprehend there was a booming real estate development during the 1920's and 1930's.

In the "roaring twenties" over forty families lived in Flomot and in 1996, fourteen families (29 residents) live within the city limits. There are only two business establishments. One is the Post Office, located east of the town intersection. Mrs. Ruth Lee contracted the Postal Service, August 1990.

The other business is the Flomot Gin. It has been a continuous business. Ebb Hewett had this first gin in Flomot, June 11, 1887. Through the years owners of the gin at this site were G. T. Meese, H. S. "Putt" Gilbert, Joe Degan, J. N. Fletcher and the Coop. Gin. The Orville and Roger Lee families are the present owners.

Every town has one....a place where farmers, ranchers, merchants and retirees gather with a cheerful smile and wholesome laughter. In the Flomot community, the favorite spot is the Flomot gin. Men and women come from Turkey, Matador, Quitauque and Flomot. It's not the coffee that draws them there. It's the ritual and conversation. It is also the location to buy a daily newspaper and soft drinks.

To give you an idea of what the conversation sounds like, imagine you are in a small cafe somewhere in Texas.

"Hey Jim, how do you like my new hearing aid?" "That's a nice one John. What kind is it?" "It's almost 8 o'clock."

Joe comes in wearing an Implement Co. red cap. "Say, Joe" said one man, "How did you ever get rid of all those relatives who used to visit you so often?" "It was easy," Joe replied. "I borrowed money from the rich ones, loaned it to the poor ones. None 'em ever came back!"

Other funny tidbits start circulating and laughter. Old-timers will start a joke and someone else will have to finish it. Remembering names...."What was the name of that fellow? Oh, I

should have remembered, it's the same as mine!"

"Boy, I enjoy that *Wheel of Fortune* T. V. game show," said one woman. "When I wrote wanting to appear on the show, Vanna White wrote back and said I was going to have to learn to spell before I could be a contestant."

"Well, I'm tired of seeing the same TV programs again," complained one woman. Joe laughed, "Reuns don't bother me, because I can't remember seeing them the first time."

Regardless where you are, there has to be at least one Aggie joke. "Have you heard the latest Aggie joke?" asked one man. He continued, "Most Aggies think Johnny Cash is a pay toilet!" laughter filled the office of the gin.

Ben walked into the gin. "Hi Ben! How was your trip to California?" With a shrug he answered, "I learned one thing, two wrongs don't make a right, but three will get you back on the freeway."

"Here comes Warren. Don't mention the depression. He'll tell us again his family was so poor, he and his brother had to ride double on a stick horse."

"How much rain did you get at your place yesterday?" Earl asks looking at Buster. "I guess I got a quarter if I got a drop. My land is dehydrated I've gone so long without a rain." "Well the majority of us are in the same condition. What we wouldn't give for a good frog croaker," said Ben.

A young lady joined the conversation, "Talking about weather, my ego was sure deflated when a teenager asked if I remembered the drought of 1934!"

When refilling cups of coffee, headlines of the day make a lively discussion.

"Man, what a mess our government is in! All politicians tell lies at one time or another." A man chimed in, "I agree with Mike Royko who wrote, 'It would be chaos if politicians told us only the truth.' How would you feel if a president said in a State of the Union Message, 'My Fellow American, boy, oh boy you wouldn't believe the mess we are in right now. I don't have the faintest idea what to do about it. Thank you and goodnight.'"

Heads nodded in agreement. The men after finishing coffee said they had to get on down the road.

"I believe I'll stick around and worry them here at the gin office for awhile," John says grinning, "Stay out of the wife's hair. She complains since I have retired she's got half the money and twice the husband. Take it easy."

So it goes at coffee drinking hang-outs everywhere.

Archeological Survey Team at Caprock Canyons State Park

 If you had ventured out to Caprock Canyons State Park this past week you would have noticed several people hiking off into the back country with complete disregard for the blazing sun above their heads. While you might have thought they were crazy, the truth is they were actually professional archeologists searching for arrowheads, hearths, historic foundations, and other interesting clues, as part of the effort to understand Texas' past.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife department archeological survey Team has been working at Caprock Canyons State Park to locate and protect the valuable cultural resources found there. "Our job is to go out to a park and locate Native American and historic artifacts, campsites and structures" says survey team leader Margaret Howard. "We then report our findings to the park manager so that he or she can plan the roads and other park facilities without disturbing any important archeological or historical sites. It's a way of making sure that no one accidentally places a picnic table on top of an Indian encampment or homestead that could give us valuable insight into Texas' history."

In order to do this, the team first walks over a section of the park looking for artifacts on the ground and for areas that might have something beneath the
