### Mail Service To Be Expanded **Fighting Pantherettes** Turkey, Quitaque and Silver-ton are among the 60 communities in the 18th Congressional District now eligible for postal home deliveries for the first time in history, according to an an-nouncement today by Congressman Bob Price.

Price has been advised by Post-master General Winton M. Blount of a major new postal service program that will expond home deliveries to an additional four million Americans, princpal-

ly in the small communities. Under the program, person living more than a quarter mile but less than half a mile from 18.700 post offices that do not have city delivery are now eligible to receive delivery at home. ligible areas. The only requirement to ob tain the service is that it must be requested of the postmaser, and a majority of those living in the area must desire the service, according to Price.

The expansion will be achieved by such steps as extending shorter rural routes and adding delivery stops to some rural routes. In other instances, "star" or con-trait routes may be used to pro-
