Baird Will Vote on Purchase of Sewer System Feb. 6

We call the attention of our readers to the following article by the City Council of Baird to the People of Baird in reference to the purchase of the Sewer System.

This is a splendid opportunity for the Citizens of Baird, Remember that to be qualified to vote in this election you must have been a resident of Baird for Six Months prior to the date of the election. You must have real or personal property which has been rendered for taxtion within the City of Baird and while the City of Baird does not levy a Poll Tax to be elegible to vote in this election--THE VOTER MUST HAVE a 1942 STATE and COUNTY POLL TAX OR LEGAL EXEMPTION from such poll tax to be qualified to vote in this election,

Last week in our letter to the Citizens of Baird, we told you we would give complete information in regards to the porposed plan for the purchasing of the existing sewer system. The following information is for your consideration;

We have made a deal with the Owners of the Baird Sewer Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Texas, whereby we can purchase the sewer system at a price of \$26,667.00, subject to the approval of the Citizens of Baird. In order to take over this system and successfully operate it, it is necessary to obtain additional material to make some extensions and minor improvements and for that reason the bonds are to be issued for \$28,000.00. This will leave a balance of \$1,333.00, with which to start operation and to make improvements, and any portion of this balance not used will be left to the credit of the bonds.

TO REDUCE RATES

Since this system has been in opreation the Citizens of Baird have paid for it, yet we do not own it; we do not wish to repeat this in the next 10 years. Another reason for the City buying this system is, to give the Citizens adequate sewer service at rates they can afford to pay. We can give a 37 1/2% reduction immediately, and hope in the future to reduce the rates further. This amount of deduction can be made by merely buying the plant and paying for it out of the revenues derived from said system. Under the present conditions, that is, with the same number of connections now served by the Sewer System, it will be possible to cut the Commercial Rate from \$4.00 to \$2.50 per month, this is a cut of 37 1/2%, the Residental Rate will be cut from \$2.50 to \$1.50 per month, this is a cut of 40%. Sewer rates like many other rates can be handled in many ways. For instance some Cities make only a minimum charge of 50c per month for Sewer Service, however you will find upon investigation that in these Cities, their Sewer System were construced with Tax Bonds, supported by a tax upon the property and not by revenue bonds. We believe that it is better for a City to build its utilities with revenue bonds and not to place a large tax burden upon the people. By using the Revenue Bond method of financing the one who receives the service is the one who pays for it, this way your sewer bill is not hidden in your tax receipt. In other words it takes so much money to build a sewer system, it takes so much to operate it, and it makes no difference how you raise these amounts, it s merely a matter of thoice for the people to make, We believe as stated before that the Revenue Bonds offers the best me-

NO INCREASE IN TAXES Voting revenue bonds will not increase your taxes. You will notice in the Official Notice of Election, calling for an election to be held on February 6th 1943, it states "each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation". No taxes can be levied on your property for the payment of this system.

BAIRD HAS RECORD Our City has one record of which we are not proud. It is the record

of having one of the highest, if not the highest sewer rate in the state. We can reduce this rate and change this record without raising your

A \$50,000.00 SYSTEM FOR \$28,000.00

Our present deal enables us to acquire a system, which to duplicate if materials and labor were available would cost approximately \$50,000.00. The present system is in excellent condition, needing only minor improvements and a few extensions. The system was constructed under capable Engineers experienced in building and operating sewer plants. It has always been considered one of the best systems for it's size in

REQUIREMENTS FOR VOTING In the election to be held on February 6, 1943, it will be necessary for the voters to have resided within the City of Baird, for six months prior to the said election and be the holder of 1942 State and County Poll Tax Receipt or legally exempted from such poll tax and to have real or personal property duly rendered for taxation within the City of Baird If you are eligible to vote, and want the Citizens of Baird to have reasonable sewer rates, then be sure and vote for the bonds on February 6th. It costs you Nothing in this instance to Help Your Town.

NO NIGGER' IN THE WOODPILE There is no catch or trick in this deal, we have an opportunity to buy a system and material necessary for imprevements and extentions for the sum of \$28,000.00. This sum to be raised by issuing revenue bonds, in other words, we buy a system already operating and pay for it out of the income derived therefrom, with the revenues from the system standing good for the debt.

Service connections on the sewer system are at a very minimum in number, and our study of this proposition shows that should we be able to increase the number of users that the rate for service could be further reduced, and it is to this end that we shall work

News From County Agents Office

W. M. Meador, County Agent income tax information and form sheets for your 1942 income tax return. A circular showing the tax and deductions for each person whether single, or married. COTTON FARMER'S

Farmers in Callahan county can organize one-variety cotton community, thereby, encouraging the production of the better varities of cotton, and to make pure planting seed available at a minimum cost. Furthermore, they will have cotton of a uniform grade and staple to sell after harvest.

Those who are members of a community or county one-variety cotton inprovement association are eligible to draw a subsidy of \$1.00 6th day of February, 1943, at which to \$2.50 on each 100 pounds of seed bought for planting. This subsidy payment will reduce the cost of seed about 75 cents per bushel. A minimum of six farmers with the cooperation of their ginner, may form a community association. Interested farmers are urged to see your local county agent W. M. Meador.

DR. J. T. GRISWOLD'S WHITE LEGHORNS HENS LAY 81,516 EGGS IN 1942

Five Hundred White Leghorn Hens produced 81,516 eggs or 6,793 dozen on Dr. J. T. Griswold's farm near Clyde in 1942. This was an average of 163 eggs per hen. An average price of 33 cents per dozen was received or \$2,242 for the total income in 1942.

Feed costs were approximately \$70.00 per month for the 3,500 pounds of grain and mash consumed. Disregarding labor and repair costs the net profit was \$1,402 per year.

When Dr. Griswold was asked how he was able to maintain a 163 egg average for his flock, he replied. "I buy good chickens from poultrymen who have proven themelves to be good breeders and plenty of feed and water are kept before the hens at all times. Strict sanitation is practiced and non-layers are culled from my flock."

SUCUCESSFUL CHICKEN RAISING

Often only simple changes in our practices results in higher pertentage of chickens raised, and an increased production from your farm poultry flock. Over crowding brooder houses results in uneven growth, colds, cannibalism, and pullet mortality. Over crowding laying houses will result in low production colds, and losses.

To prevent over crowding one square foot of floor space should be allowed for 2 chickens. There should be enough feeder space to allow each chicken 1 inch, and onequarter of water is sufficient for 25 chicks, A 12x12, 144 square feet, brooder house will accomidate 300 chicks. Three square feet of floor space should be allowed for laying bens. A 20x20 bouse will accomidate 135 hens. You can get more eggs from fewer hens if they are not crowded. Allow 3 inches of feed er space per laying hen, and five gallons of water daily for each 100

Fryers are a good price, therefore, encouraging the buying of straight run chickens and grow out the fryers. Two groups of chickens can be handled on the average farm very easy by buying the first group

in February or March, and the second group in April or May. Order close to home from a reputable crowded to the limit, and a delay in delivery will mean weak chickens and losses. The placing of orders will insure deliveries that will fit your program. \$t is my observation that many hens are not producting at a maximum because they are too fat. Reduce the grain feeding to 12 pounds per day for each 100 hens, but give the hens all the laying mesh they will eat.

1. That an election be held in said City of Baird, Texas, on the election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the City Council of the City of Baird, Texas, be authorized to issue the revenue bonds of said City in the sum of Twenty Eight Thousand (\$28,000.00) Dollars, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than thirty (30) years from their date, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed four (4%) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, for the purpose of purchasing, repairing and extending an existing privately owned Sanitary Sewer System in the City of Baird, Texas, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of said system, and by an additional pledge of such portion of the net revenues of the City owned waterworks system as, together with the pledged revenues from said sewer system, will be sufficient to pay said bonds as they mature and the interest as it accrues."

That said election shall be held at the City Hall in the City of Baird, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-

3. 8he said election shall be held under the provisions of Chanter 1, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, including the provisions of Article 704, as amended by Chapter \$82, passed at the First Called Session of the Forty Fourth Legislature, effective October 11, 1935, and in accordance with the provisjons of Chapter 163, Acts of the Regular Session of the Forty Second Legistlature, as further modified by the provisions of Article 1111-1118, inclusive, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, Only legally qualified electors who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to

Ceiling Price On Milk Devised

Effectively today, a revision in the ceiling price of fluid sweet milk for Callahan County has been ordered in a new regulation issued by the Southwest regional OPA Office, Ralph Ashlock, chairman of the local War Price and Rationing Board announced

The ceiling price revision in Callahan County is part of a regionwide program designed to restore balance in the supply of mily to diferent communities and for diferent uses. The order hikes prices in a mojority of the areas, but maintains present levels in some while reducting prices in a few areas.

6 cents 5 1-2 cents pint Culminating two month's work, regional OPA oficials in Dallas ordered the new price revision to replace the Renewal Maximum Price Regulation which set the ceiling price of mily for retailers and wholesalers at the highest price each individual seller charged in March, 1942. There is no ceiling at the producer level,

The freezing of prices at the March highest level, in many istances, caused diversions of milk from one area with a low ceiling to an area with a high ceiling and also caused diversion of milk from normal consumption channels to manufacturing channels.

The new regulation only sets a maximum price which can be charged for milk in this county wholesalers and retailers can sell at any price below the ceiling. Petitions for adjustments can be made to the Office of Price Administration at Dallas, Texas. Under the miximum price regulation which revises the ceiling prices for milk, every county, parish, city and town in Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Missouri and Kansas are placed in either Class 1, 2 or 4 in Zone 1, or in Class 1, 2 or 3 in Zone 2, Callahan County is in Class 3, Zone 2.

(b) If there have been no substantial changes since the date of the original application in the applicant's gasoline needs, or in the nature, amount and conditions of use of the motor vehicle for which the original ration was issued, and if such original application accurately tely calculated the applicant's requirements, application for a renewal thereof (except in the case of a Basic or Special ration or a Transport ration issued for use with a motor vehicle for the operation of which a Certificate of War Necessity is required) may be made by executing the renewal certifi-'cate on such original application, which is on file with the Caffahan County Wor Price and Rationing Board. The applicant shall in such case not on such renewal certifi-'cate any changes in the nature or amount of his use since the date of the original application.

Where there has been a change madei n the applicant's driving needs, necessitating the use of more gasoline, it will be necssary that a new application be filed. This may be done at any time within thirty (30) days of the expiration date of the current ration, as stated a-






Your local board can better carry out the duties required of it if you will keep it well informed of your status at all times and the public in gereral will understand better tht action thit is taken by the board when the local board is well informed on all facts concerning its registrants.





What I myself saw in my four years in Europe gave me a new realization of the priceless rights which we here enjoy. No secret police can in the night

whisk us away, never again to be seen by those we love. None of us can be deprived by any party, state or tyrant of those pre-

cious civil liberties which our laws and our courts guarantee. None of us can be persecuted for practicing the faith which we found

at our mother's knee. None of us oes be persecuted, tor-tured or killed because of the fact that an accident of fate might have made us of the same race as the

Mazarene. No American can be placed by any party or government in a regi-mented vice which takes from him or her either accident of economic opportunity or political religious lib-

What would the millions of unfortunate men, women and children in Europe give to be able to live and enjoy such a way of life?

Well, in this war, those are the things in our lives which are in jeopardy. Our boys are dying to preserve them for us.

Then we can do no less than to "say yes" and fill those war stamp albums. It is our duty and privilege to help the secretary of the treasury, Mr. Morgenthau, in his magnificent effort to do the tremendous job of getting the money to keep our boys supplied with the weapons with

which to fight our fight.
