Unique Chamber of Commerce Banquet Scheduled March 12

The Quitaque Chamber of Commerce Banquet will be a unique experience this year. The event is scheduled for Thursday, March 12, 7:00 p.m., at the Community Center. The banquet meal will be catered by Roye Pigg. He will be serving his world renowned fajitas. Roye's Sportsman was recently recognized as one of the top cafes in Texas by Texas Highways magazine.

Musical entertainment for the banquet will be provided by Brass and Ivory from Hart, Texas. Brenda Campbell, who plays the piano for the group, teaches in the Hart schools and plays organ and piano at the United Methodist Church. James Campbell plays the trumpet and he farms and ranches in the Hart and Matador communities. TO THE PEOPLE OF TURKEY:

I would like to thank each and everyone of you that have supported me in the past. I hope that you will support, trust and have faith in me once again as I am seeking re-election as Sheriff of Hall County. I made you a promise the last time I ran for this office, and that was I would do the best job for you that I possibly could do for you. I believe I have done that. I know that I haven't pleased everybody, but I can say that I have honestly tried.

Some people were dissatisfied with me during the Bob Wills Celebration, because the Texas Department of Public Safety Troopers show up. People, think back in the middle 70s when Sheriff Elmer Neel called all of the law enforcement officers out of your town, and the people started tearing up your town, and the next day you were wanting some help. Ever since you have had a Bob Wills celebration, there have always been State Troopers there. No one can keep the State Troopers from coming in and working, they can work any public road in the State of Texas. I can make you one more promise and that is, whoever the Sheriff may be, whether it is me or someone else, as long as there is a Bob Wills celebration, there will be State Troopers there. I will tell you this, they are not bringing as many to the celebration as they used to. They are there to help us to keep the people from ruining your town and name. I am not against the Bob Wills celebration, but I do believe in trying to protect you and your town.

In January of 1989, I swore on a oath that I would uphold the laws of this State and county, to protect and serve you. I can truly say that I have done that to the best of my ability. During my campaign here in Turkey, some people have told me that my opponent has told you people that I had fired him because I said he had to start writing 10 tickets a day. Well, that is not true, he came to me and said that he was going to resign because they thought that they might be moving to Colorado. It is against the law to set a quota on giving tickets. Since I have been in law enforcement, I have never had any of my people give a certain amount of tickets, that is not what we are here for.

I hope this has cleared some things up. I hope you will put your trust and faith in me for another term. You voted for me four years ago to run this office because you trusted me. I don't feel like I have let you down. In closing I would like to say one more thing. When my opponent announced that he was running against me for Sheriff, he stated that he had 600 hours of training and education. No people stop and think, you get the scales of Justice out and you put his 600 hours of training and education on one side and you put my 22 years of experience on the other side and see what you get the most of. The decision is yours to make, do you want someone to serve as your Sheriff and to run the office with 600 hours of training and education or someone that has 22 years of experience. I don't really think you want a change. You know the old saying "If it is not broke, don't fix it" Well this office is not broke and it sure don't need fixing. I have heard a lot of people tell me that they are satisfied with what we got and that everything was running good, so why change it?

All I ask of you is to remember me on Tuesday, March 10, 1992, when you go to the polls to cast your vote. Once again I say thank you for your confidence and support for me these past years and I hope you place your trust, faith, confidence and support for me once again. Thank you.

Kacey performed "Sonata in G" by Mozart in the most difficult division, and received a II rating, which is excellent. Brandi Brunson, in the Freshman Division, performed "Elfin Dance" by Grieg, and received an excellent II rating. 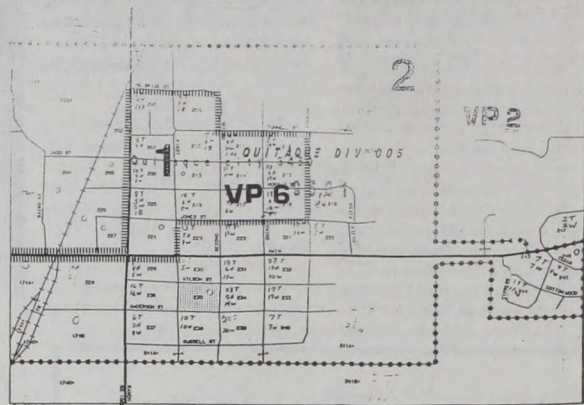
