Citizens May Have Say In The Continuation of Annual Park Fee

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commissioners will vote on proposed fee increases for hunting, fishing, parks, and other activities at its March 28 Meet-

Andrew Sansom, executive director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department stated the fee increases are needed because all sources of department revenue are declining.

Money from the fees being

proposed will be used to fund all of the activities of the department since it will no longer receive General Revenue funds, Sanson said.

Committee on **Library Meets**

She also inspected the old City Hall building upon the recommendation from the City Council that it be used for establishing a public library. Floor plans are now being drawn up to reflect the needs

recognized in the surveys.

The Library committee will meet on Thursday, March 14, at 5:00 p.m. at the Community Center to discuss the results of the survey and the next steps to be taken in establishing a public library in Quitaque, anyone who is interested in this project is encouraged to attend.

Several items are on the agenda for these proposed funds, of which development of 400,000 acres of undeveloped State Park lands is one. Keep highly qualified wildlife, fisheries, and park managers who are currently moving to other states because of low salaries are a few others.

Mayor Conner states, "One of the proposals in the Texas Parks and Wildlife proposed restructuring is to eliminate the 'Restricted Annual' permits that allow local residents who are frequent visitors unlimited visits to a specific state park at the one time annual fee which currently is \$13. I think this will tend to create barriers between the local citizens and the parka sense of being pushed aside. 'Quitaque' has publicized Caprock Canyons State Park and worked very closely with park management. We want to try and stop any barriers being put up. Fee increases are necessary and annual permits at an increased fee are acceptable, but no annual permits would be unacceptable for our locals."

'Caprock Canyons State Park is an intimate part of this community," according to Chamber of Commerce President, Steve Ulrey. "We feel a tremendous amount of pride in the fact that Caprock Canyons is one of the fastest growing parks in the state in visitation.

"The Chamber will continue to support the Park and its management in our promotional efforts and developement

"We heartily oppose any move to discontinue restricted use permits, which provide entrance to a specific park for an annual fee. This would adversely effect the community's relationship with Caprock Canyons by making many resi-


Hall County Proud Meets



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


