High Levels Of Performance By Migrant Students At Valley School

Turkey-Quitauque Independent School District is among 161 Texas Public school districts being recognized for high levels of performance by migrant students, Superintendent Jerry Smith announced today.

Turkey-Quitauque Independent School District was commended for having an attendance rate of 94 percent or higher for migrant students and for having at least 80 percent of migrant students graduating from high school or being promoted to the next grade.

Criteria for the commendation were based on 1994-95 PEIMS data (Public Education Information Management System) with districts divided by migrant population into five categories: 1,000 migrant students or more, 501 to 999, 100 to 500, 25 to 100, and less than 25 migrant students.

In addition to district recognition, campuses were rated as exceptional, excellent, promising, or acknowledged, based on the number of migrant students taking the TAAS tests in grades 3 through 8 and 10 and their performance on the examination.

Texas has the second-largest migrant education program in the nation in numbers of students served. During the 1994-95 school year, more than 134,000 Texas students were educated through migrant education programs in 390 districts and the 20 regional education service centers. About one-third of these students migrated to 42 other states where they were able to continue their education.

Turkey-Quitauque ISD Migrant Education Program officials are Janice Wheeler and Sarah Hinojosa. Jerry Smith said, "I want to compliment the entire Valley staff for the success of our Migrant Programs."

Rifles Found

Christopher Logan and Ruben Rodarte, both 28, of Amarillo have been charged on two counts each of attempted capital murder. The two are charged with shooting at game wardens, Gary Hunt and Gary Self, who were patrolling east of Silverton on October 13, 1996 about 1 a.m. The two men remain in the Swisher County Jail.

The rifles which authorities believe to be used to shoot at the game wardens have been recovered in the rough canyons of the caprock east of Silverton.

Neither game warden was injured. The suspects fled the scene on foot after firing at the game wardens leaving behind their pickup and four dead deer which they had shot.

They were apprehended by two employees of the JA Ranch in Armstrong County after a three day search. They were unarmed at the time they were apprehended.

P'Jay Merrell To Represent Valley School

P'Jay Merrell will represent Valley High School at the State Cross-Country meet held at Round Rock (near Austin) on November 9, 1996.

The race will take place at 12 noon Saturday. P'Jay advances via his second place finish at District and a 6th place finish at Regionals held at Lubbock, November 2.

Merrell is the son of Warren Lee and the late Jan Merrell of Quitauque.

Beck, Wilde Win Sheriff's Races In Briscoe, Hall

Briscoe County's Jerry Beck handily won the Sheriff's election Tuesday, with 638 votes, in an unopposed race for that office.

William (Bill) Smith received 615 votes, and Kelly Dunbar, 161 for County Attorney of Briscoe County. Both were write-in candidates, and in Quitauque, their votes were 61 for Smith in Prec. 1, 159 in Prec. 2; Dunbar had 5 in Prec. 2, and 2 in Prec. 1.

Voting in Precinct 1 (Quitauque) were 64 persons, and 177 voted in Precinct 2.

In other contested races: Terry Grimland was elected Commissioner of Precinct 1 with 121 votes. Incumbent Aaron Younger received 85 votes.

In Hall County (Turkey is in this county) Democrat Jarrett L. Wilde was elected Sheriff, with 871 votes, over Republican Glenn Callahan, who ran on a write-in ticket, receiving 439 votes.

U.S. Representative Mac Thornberry (R) received 844 votes in Hall County to win over Sam Silverman, Democrat, with 573 votes.

In Briscoe County, Thornberry received 558 votes, to Silverman's 308.

GED Classes Available At Valley School On Tuesdays

Classes are currently being offered at Valley School for adults who are preparing to take the GED high school equivalency test. The classes, which have been in progress for three sessions, will meet each Tuesday evening for three hours, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

Many adults have not completed a regular high school program, but their educational growth and experiences have not ceased on leaving school. It is the purpose of the GED Testing program to provide a means by which adults can gain from educational experiences and earn high school equivalency diplomas. With diplomas, an individual will be enabled to obtain certain jobs, gain promotions, or pursue higher education or other personal goals.

Currently, all fifty states now use and accept GED Test results and use the test for issuing high school equivalency credentials. These credentials are official documents and are nearly always accepted by employers, training programs or universities in lieu of high school diplomas or transcripts.

The ability to read and comprehend written material is a basic skill for all subject areas tested by the GED. Students will be tested in the areas of Writing, Social Studies, Science, Interpreting Literature, and Math.
