



EAT TO COMPETE By Lynda Fogerson Briscoe Co. CEA-HE

An important issue facing parents with children or adolescents in sports is how to provide nutritious meals around hectic practice and competition sche-dules. The athlete's diet must provide a variety of foods to insure that all nutritional needs can be met and enough calories to meet the energy needs of this active

Breakfast is essential to provide teenage and pre-teen ath-letes with energy and nutrients to start the day. However, many teens omit breakfast because they do not have to time to eat or feel that they are not hungry at that time of day. Parents and coaches can encourage young athletes to eat breakfast for a "running start.

Breakfast can include any nu-tritious foods from the food groups, even those not tradi-ionally considered breakfast foods. Possible foods the young athlete could prepare and eat "or the run" include: milkshakes, peanut butter sandwiches, fresh fruit and fruit juices, dried fruit, boiled eggs, cheese, egg burritos, oatmeal or raisin cookies, yogurt granola bars, and many others.

A variety of nutritious snacks available throughout the day will provide additional calories and nutrients to meet the energy needs of the athlete. Snacking can be good if the athlete makes wise snack choices. Snacks with a higher sugar content lack the

pizza, fruits, breads, milk, ice necessary calories and nutrition for the active athlete.

A pre-competition meal should be eaten three to four hours before the game and should consist primarily of high-carbohydrate foods like pancakes, waffles, macaroni, potatoes, bread, and similar foods. This meal should be relatively low in fat and protein. Usually fat leaves the stomach in about 5 hours; protein foods in about 3 hours; and carbohydrate foods leave the stomach in about 2 hours. The best diet plan includes carbohydrate foods primarily from the fruit and vegetable and bread and cereal groups. Concentrated sweets or simple sugars are not recom-mended since large amounts of

the athlete during the entire year, not just during the competitive season. Athletes must learn to adjust the calories in their diet to the energy requirements of the training and competitive season as well as the off-season. Weight problems can result when the sports season is over and less energy is used.


