HIGH PLAINS RESEARCH FIELD DAY DATE SET

The Twelfth Annual Field Day of the High Plains Research Foundation will be held on Thursday, September 12, at the Foundation Research Farm at Halfway, Texas. Dr. Tom Longnecker, Director and Executive Vice - President, in announcing the date said, The second Thursday in September has long been established as the date for our Annual Field Days.

Five of the Commodity Committees of the Board of Trustees are planning to have exhibits of plants and products of each commodity. These exhibits will be located in the farm shop. Seed Production Laboratory and the 20 Saw Laboratory Gin. Throughout the afternoon members of the committee concerned, plus others invited to assist who are interested in agricultural production displayed, will be host for the exhibits. Plans, products, treatments and equipment used for each of the several phases of Agricultural research will be shown.

Field tours of the Research Farm featuring studies underway at the Foundation will start at 1:00 p.m. and continue until 4:45 p.m. Guides for each large truck will be professional agricultural personnel.

A popular feature of the Field Days has been the display of the latest farm equipment and supplies. The various manufacturing firms supply the display and have representatives on hand to explain and sometimes demonstrate. The various firms are allotted space on the grounds of the Halfway Community Building on the basis of first reservations being received being given priority on sites of their equipment or product.

The display of activities and programs of the various governmental agricultural service is another feature of the Field Days. Included are: Farm Home Administration, Extension Division, Soil Conservation Services, Tri - County Weed Control and Home Demonstration Services.

The evening program will start at 5:00 p.m. An outstanding Agricultural speaker is a feature of the evening program. Attendance prizes will be drawn using names of those who register. Another drawing will be held for current members of the Research Foundation.

Dr. Longnecker stated that the attendance for the last several years has numbered from 3,500 to 8,000. We are expecting a large attendance this year as there are some new and interesting research results to be shown.

PAMPA RODEO PLANS SET

Pampa is all decked out with new street decorations in preparation for the 24th annual Top of Texas Rodeo scheduled July 24 - 27.

The big RCA rodeo will get underway on Wednesday, July 24, with a street parade at 4:00 P.M. and the first rodeo performance at 8:00 P.M.

Butler & Son, of Elk City, Okla. will furnish stock and direct the arena. The Butlers own some of the roughest rodeo stock in the business, and they will be challenging some of the top professional cowboys in the world at the Pampa show. Senator Clem McSpadden, of Claremore, Okla. will be this year's announcer. Quail Dobbs, world - famous rodeo clown, will be on hand to fight the bulls and entertain with his antics. Dobbs is especially famous for his hilarious comedy car, "GEMINI," which is a dilapidated 1910 T Model Ford.

The featured special attraction is the Judy Lynn Show, direct from Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas. Judy will make an appearance at each rodeo performance and will play for dancing in the National Guard Armory on the rodeo ground Wednesday through Saturday nights. The Judy Lynn Show is considered the top Western show in the world and is being brought back to Pampa this year by popular demand.

A purse of \$4,200, plus all entry fees, will provide a total purse of approximately \$10,000.

The regular RCA rodeo events will be included on the two - round program, plus the popular cowgirls' barrel race and a special amateur bareback riding contest.

Livestock utilization of grain sorghum, forage sorghum and corn and products made from these crops will be the major theme of an exhibit at the Twelfth Annual Field Day of the High Plains Research Foundation on Thursday, September 12.

Members of the Commodity Committee of the Board of Trustees for these crops are preparing the exhibit and will be hosts that afternoon. Explanation of the value of these crops and products in livestock production will be made for visitors by the hosts. Materials and methods to illustrate their use will be shown, by the use of pictures, slides, charts and graphs. Marketing programs, especially in the development of foreign markets, will be presented

by the Grain Producers Association. Various varieties of the crops will be displayed and literature describing values and growing period will be available. The Commodity Committee will be assisted by representatives of organizations and firms interested in production, marketing and feeding operations. The display will be located in the seed processing laboratory at the Foundation.

Wayne Byerly, Chairman of the Commodity Committee, has scheduled a meeting of the committee at the Foundation headquarters at Halfway the afternoon of August 8. This meeting will (1) complete their exhibit plans, (2) review progress to date of the Foundations

1968 research programs for this crops involved, and (3) prepare recommendations for the 1969 research programs. These proposals will be presented to the Board of Trustees at the Semi-annual Meeting the morning of September 12.

NOTES FROM HEMISFAIR

San Antonio, Texas — The world's craziest bank robbery takes place five times daily at the San Antonio World's Fair, producing as many belly laughs as pistol shots for a delightful audience.

The action is at Tommy Worrell's Wild West Show, a recent addition to the free on - grounds entertainment offered to Fair visitors.

Worrell, an ex - Hollywood stuntman from San Antonio, mixes authentic Western gear and setting with such lines as "heah come de judge." The 36 - year - old quick draw artist began his HemisFair career with a wandering fast draw exhibition featuring himself and national fast - draw champion

Mike Cristofolletti, also of San Antonio.

Using real - single - action Colt 45's with blanks, he soon generated enough interest to add four more actors and build a permanent Old West set, complete with a saloon, jail and of course, a bank. Worrell, Cristofolletti and two others come into town to rob the bank, but don't count on the Buntline - Special tootin' marshal who naturally wins in the end.

The dialogue for the skit is ad - lib, with changes coming anytime one of the actors decides one is needed.

Before the marshal finishes with the bad guys, they have dynamited the bank, blown up the jail to free Cristofolletti and had an old - fashioned gunfight.

Worrell also puts on a fast - draw exhibition after the skit, showing how he and Cristofolletti can draw, cock and fire a gun before someone in the audience can even pull the trigger or clap their hands.

From the tourist in sunglasses walking shorts to the leaders of nations . . . they are all flocking to the San Antonio World's Fair.

The summer crowds have invaded HemisFair for vacations that in many cases have been extended for that extra day of fiesta fun.

Despite the record crowds converging on the 92.6 - acre showcase, Visitor Services, Inc. reports plenty of rooms and parking — with neither catching a full load to date.

The Fair recorded its 3 millionth visitor July 9, only 27 days after reaching 2 million. The 2 millionth visitor took 30 days and the first million was not reached until the exposition was 38 days old. Daily records were set seven out of nine days in early July.

Among the guests of the World's Fair during the first week of July was President Lyndon Johnson and the ambassadors of a host of countries — probably the most distinguished group of dignitaries ever assembled outside of Washington.

Following President Johnson by two days was President Rene Barrientos of Bolivia, who took an extended tour of the World's Fair.

estate would be later. Briefly, the rules are: You can give each of your children, grandchildren, etc., \$3000 each year without paying any gift tax or being liable for estate tax later (unless you die within three years after the gift). Out of community property, you and your spouse can give \$3000 each or \$6000 to each child, grandchild or other beneficiary. By filing a gift tax return, Form 709, with the Internal Revenue Service you can give \$30,000 tax free out of your estate. Of course, in community property this would be doubled to \$60,000 tax free from both spouses. This must also be more than three years before date of death. So, if you and your wife have three children who are all married, and you have nine grandchildren, you can give your 15 heirs \$6,000 each, tax free, or \$90,000 a year. By filing a form 709 with Internal Revenue you can use your \$60,000 exemption (two 30,000 life time exemptions), you can pass \$150,000 out of your estate the first year and \$90,000 a year thereafter, tax free, provided you live three years after the gift. If you are making an estate plan, it is probably advisable to consult an experienced Federal estate and gift tax consultant.

Man With A Memory

National Political Convention's TV Know-It-All

A gagel brings to order a political convention. But who brings order to the million details that go into the gagel coverage of political conventions on television? Behind the NBC coverage of the Republican and Democrat conventions are a dozen unit managers whose job it is to see to everything from housing and headpieces to "how can we get this done in time?"

One of these men is Gene Whitlock who has been a unit manager for various NBC shows since 1956. At the conventions he is the NBC unit manager in charge of production and related business matters for Gulf Oil Corporation, which again is sponsoring the television and radio coverage. Mr. Whitlock sees it that the film libraries at both convention sites have the programmed commercials ready for use at the right time. He knows the running time and the intricacies of scheduling. He works with the advertising agencies in assuring the air quality of the film or tape and he must be ready for every contingency. If a sudden shift in schedule comes, such as "Drop Reel Number 106 and get Reel Number 127 on tape for the next break," Mr. Whitlock has to be able to quickly coordinate the network operations and insure the changes.

Mr. Whitlock must know a thousand things about the convention hall, the city, the political parties and their various candidates. Long before the convention opening, he has surveyed both the Miami and Chicago convention sites to learn the ins and outs, basements and lifts of the halls and the housing, food and transportation situations of both cities. He must sit on planning committee meetings and know how to obtain credential clearances and how to make one ticket to the gallery do the work of ten tickets, all within the tight regulations of

ing their lives for the next four years.

For Mr. Whitlock this assignment appeals to his deepest scholastic interest. He majored in history at Brown University, where he was graduated in 1954. "Reading history as recorded in a book is just not as exciting as seeing it enacted on a convention floor," he said. "In the roll call of states you feel the power of democracy working right before your eyes."

their behavior, says the Texas A&M University specialist. Parents must be aware of what their children are telling by their behavior yet they should not put every little act or expression under a microscope.

A child's behavior communicates more than his talk, according to Miss Kitching. The keys to understanding this are reserving judgment, avoiding labels, accepting personality differences and being aware that the apparent cause of an incident may not be the real one.

In trying to discover the meaning of behavior, Miss Kitching points out some of the obstacles. Common is labeling automatically a kind of behavior which doesn't tell why he is automatically a kind of behavior which doesn't tell why he is behaving as he is.

For example, if he rejects a suggestion it may not be "stubborn" or if he fails to be up and doing it may not be "lazy." Perhaps he is stubborn about getting gressed in the morning because he is not eager to go to school.

Giving labels to behavior and putting actions into categories prevent understanding and give us too easy an out, says Miss Kitching.

Relieving anxiety and worry with a handy phase often drains him need to do something more constructive than to praise or blame.

"She just wants attention. He'll grow out of it" are common phrases that may block further exploration of a child's actions.

Yet, the specialist points out another factor in understanding children and deciphering their behavior: the parent's makeup. Everyone is in trouble if the parent's emotions differ from the child.

Too, the connection between a behavior and its cause's are ways obvious.

Have a wide-angle approach to understanding children, suggest Miss Kitching. A certain behavior may have several possible causes. A nightmare could be caused by too much candy or a television program—or something else.

But the family life specialist urged parents not to interpret a child's behavior to him before he has a chance to realize it himself.

Given a little time, he might figure out his own feelings and put them into his own words, a much bigger contribution to growing.

The story is that the President was a bit upset at the refusal and just came out with it—"Maybe you don't know who I am. I am the President of the United States." The hound-loving friend's reply was that he didn't give a hoot if

he was Bookler T Washington, he didn't get the hounds.

July 14, 1955 — Think of my shock just a few minutes ago when I came to realize that I was missing out on "As the World Turns." I was able to get the last of the episode. 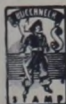
