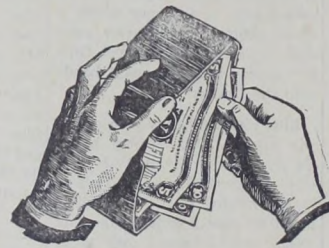

Johnny Helms Writes About Life In Vietnam

The war in Vietnam came close to Quitaque when one of its own young men lost his life, but we still are inclined to grow complacent and forget the horrors of war.

Mr and Mrs. Bill Helms received a letter from Johnny Helms this week and they want to share a part of it with us. Following is the contents:

"Dear Mom and Dad, I just received your letter, sure good to hear from you all.

It is hot here, too. The humidity stays anywhere from 80-100 percent, and the temperature anywhere from 90-110 degrees. Our clothes won't dry, and you perspire all the time. The nights are fairly cool. Sometimes it gets down to 75 degrees and when it does, I almost freeze.

Today there isn't much going on. We just got in a supply of water and ammo. Finished breaking it out about an hour ago. We are still

at the same position at DaNang. Sure is pretty from up here, too. The rumor is going around we are going to move a little higher on the hill. If we do that will mean about a month of hard work, building new houses, ammo bunkers, and new rest rooms, too. Everything from scratch.

Boy, mail call is something up here. It's about all there is to look forward to.

There are 10 men to a gun, and 3 guns up here. One man from each gun gets to go into DaNang for our personal gear and business every day. I got to go in day before yesterday. Got me some tamales, weiner, crackers, and got some of the other boys cigarettes, tobacco, and also some comic books. I'm a little old for comic books, but it keeps my mind off of the war and passes time. Everybody trades their reading material around until everyone has I'm not having a bit of trouble

read it one or two times at least, "roughing it". I guess there are some things Dad used to tell me when he was young and cowboying it, on how to get along on a little of nothing. Every time we start to eat, all my buddies come to me to boil the coffee and cook. I keep thinking about those hard biscuits Dad used to tell me about. I can see how they would taste good even if they were hard. I use the soup of my tamales today and crumbled crackers into them and made pretty good mush, too.

Well, that's about how we live here. Oh, our shower is homemade, too. It's made one the side of a hill out of an old bomb, with a pipe running out of the shower area. We have to do our own laundry too. Usually me and a buddy

of mine boil our clothes together. Takes a little longer to boil them, but it gets mighty clean. Our "hootch" as we call them are made of old ammo boxes and sand bags which is fairly cool inside.

Well, tell everyone in the Quitaque area hello from me. Write and you can sure send me the Quitaque Post. I'd like that very much.

Take care of yourselves.
