The CDBG program was created by congress in 1974, with program funding divided into two major categories --entitle-ment cities over 50,000 and nonentitlement cities under

Nonentitlement localities generally compete for statewide funding on an annual basis.

Purposes of the program are to primarily benefit persons of low and moderate income; aid in eliminating slums nd blight; meeting other community needs of health and safety.

Some of the general eligible activies include public facilities improvements, housing assistance activities, economic development activities, activities to alleviate the effects of unanticipated disasters and activities to address situations that pose an imminent threat to public health and safety.

Funding is available annually and grant awards are determined through annual competition in each of the 24 state planning regions.




