Set-aside requirements of the 1973 Feed Grain Program are being reduced in order to achieve larger corn and soybean crops and thereby meet an increase in demestic and export demand which has developed since the program was announced December 11, Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz said today.

The required set-aside for full compliance has been changed from 30 to 25% of a producer's feed grain base and for participants electing not to comply fully with the saturday and Sunday with Miss Amy Davis and Sunday with Miss Amy

Through a combination of the set-aside payment and the 5-month (October the payment rate will be 32 cents ment and the 5-month (October February) national average market price for the respective grains, participants who set aside 25% of their feed grain base will be guaranteed a national average return equal to 70% of parity on October 1, 1973. This guarantee is based on production from one-half of their corn, grain sorghum or barley bases. Supplemental payments, if any, to such farmers will be made as soon as possible after March 1, 1974.

Producers who elect not to set side acreage but do not increase their feed grain acreage above 1972 will be eligible for a lower payment rate of 15 cents per bushel for corn, 14 cents per bushel for grain sorghum and 12 cents per bushel on barley on one-half the feed grain base. Such parti-cipants will receive this payment as soon as possible after July 1, 1973, but will not be eligible for the feed grain base.
