Mailed To Defaulted Texans

## The Texas Guaranteed Stu he withholding be done admin-

 dent Loan Corporation has mailed the first wage withholding notices to Texans who have defaulted on their federallyguaranteed students loans guaranteed students loans.
Recipients have 30 days to make repayment arrangements or file an appeal before their employer is notified to withhold up to $10 \%$ of the employees net pay. Wage withholding is argua-
bly the most powerful bly the most powerful tool for
the collection of defaulted puar anteed student loan balances. It was made possible in Texas by passage of the November 1991 Energency Unemploymen Benefit CompensationAct. Defaulted borrowers who enter into voluntary repayment
with TGSLC will not be subjected to wage withholding Borrowers can call toll-free 1 800-222-6297 to set up a repay ment agreement.
The first group of borrowers 6 recieve withholding notices is tire population, according to tire population, according to tor of Public Affairs. The group includes trade school, two-year and four-year college and university graduates. Loan bal ances range from $\$ 1,100$ to $\$ 26,860$ for seven loans. Most than a year with no resolution on their accounts. Some have already had judgments filed against them but have still no istratively-which means that no court action is needed. It allows able $10 \%$ of a borrower's disposto be applied to their defaulted loan balance until it is paid in
