

In the race for Council Member, Place 4, Vicki Lindsy received 104 votes and Richard Greene received 3 votes.




Turkey - A severe thunderstorm that produced funnel clouds ignited a grass fire in Hall County on Monday, officials said.

However, the county also re-ceived up to four inches of rain in some areas of open range, negating the threat of fire, said Ken Schneider, lead forecaster at the National Weather Service in Amarillo.

Shortly before 7 p.m., lightning sparked a fire in CRP grass just south of Turkey, said a spokes-woman for the Hall County Sheriff's Department.

The fire was brought under control within an hour and did not cause major damage, she said.

The National Weather Service in Lubbock issued tornado warnings for Hall County around 7:15 p.m. Monday, indicating a developing twister five miles east/northeast of Turkey moving south/southeast.

Winning Essay For **Bob Wills Princess** Why We Need Events Like Bob Wills Day In Our Community



OVEN ROASTED CATFISH WITH SWEET ONION MARMALADE Ingredients.

- pounds thinly sliced sweet yellow onions (approximately 8 small onions)
- cups chicken stock teaspoon thyme, leaves only quart heavy cream
- 1/2

tablespoons balsamic vinegar genuine U.S. farm-raised catfish fillets Salt and pepper (to taste)



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The Marmalade. Place onions in a heavy bottomed saucepan and add the stock. Cover the pan and cook over moderate heat for 15 minutes. Remove the cover and add the thyme leaves. Continue to cook for about 45 minutes, until the onions start to color and the liquid is almost evaporated. Add cream and con-tinue to cook until the mixture is thick. Add the vinegar and

Spread 1 tablespoon of sweet onion marmalade on each fillet. Beginning at the small or tail end, wrap the fillet onto itself to produce a tight spiral. Secure with a toothpick. Place the catfish in a shallow baking dish, keeping them from touching. Top each with 1 tablespoon of sweet onion marmalade. Bake at 350 F° for 10 minutes. Remove from oven and let sit for 5 minutes. Heavier rains were noted, however, in other nearby locations. John Sharp reports failure of a set of terraces east of town which were engineered to hold a total of 3 inches of rain per hour. The failure of this heavy earthwork is taken as an indication that well over the theoretical 3 inches fell on these particular terraces, and speculation runs as high as an estimate of 6 inches of water received per hour in several small areas east of Turkey.




