Capture Capering Kids In Memorable Movies

NEW YORK, N.Y. (ED)—Turn most children loose outdoors and you can be sure of one thing—they will not sit still. Given the opportunity, they will run and climb and dangle and ride, with some skipping, skating and sliding thrown in.

movie camera, but one which
will allow you to follow and
film the action, indoors, outdoors, in sunshine or shadow,
without worrying about adjustments. The Kodak XL320

a film cartridge, aim and
shoot.



Outlining your subject against the sky by aiming upward is a good technique whether you are making still pictures or movies.

You are free to concentrate You are free to concentrate on what and how you shoot. "What," in this case, is attractive, busy kids who, in themselves, do a great deal to make your movies appealing and interesting. But, no matter how appealing they are, you can enhance your movies still further by the use of simple filming techniques.

First, provide visual variety by mixing long, medium and close shots. As you change your filming position, also change your shooting angle.

Scene length should be varied as well. Five to fifteen seconds (averaging out at ten) is the recommended rule.

Watch the background and, when possible, adjust your shooting angle to avoid distracting clutter.

Be alert for opportunities for foreground framing, in or out of focus. Branches, fences, gates and so on addiust as much to the composition of a movie frame as they do to a snapshot.

It goes almost without saying that you film only while standing still. Movement belongs in the movie, not in the camera.

If you do find it necessary to move the camera in order to keep a running figure in your viewfinder, be sure to do it slowly and steadily rotating your body from the waist.

There is really only one last point to remember. Movies should be fun to make as well as fun to view, so—enjoy.



In the world coffee crop. The freeze is expected to cut in half next year's harvest of coffee beans in Brazil," points out Dr. Russell McDonald, economist in marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Furthermore, this year's world coffee crop is down about 3 per cent from that of last year."

Buyers in the United States generally have small inventories and were anticipating a large coffee crop for the 1975-76 crop year, which would have meant lower prices. But, they must now build their stocks in the wake of the distance of the world of the worl

"Following the July freeze, the New York cash price for green coffee jumped about 20 cents per pound from the June average of 55 to 65 cents for Arabica coffees.

Despite the lowered production forecast for the coming crop year, there will be enough coffee to go around, notes the Texas A&M University System economist. How ever, reserve stocks will be down sharply. U. S. Department of Agriculture officials estimate tha Brazil now holds about 21 mil lion begs of coffee in reserve. The million begs of contee in reserve. The country annually exports about 18 million bags and itself consumes another 8 million. So, carryover stocks going into the 1976-77 crop year are highly uncertain at this point and will depend heavily or just how short next year's harvest is in Brazil.

"One thing is for sure, though," says McDonald. "That cup of cof fee is going to cost more."


