A most special thing for a young boy is to be around grown men when they just get together and jaw That's what my Dad called it, you know, socialize. When relatives came to visit, the women would go in the house and talk, usually ending up in the kitchen, putting together lunch. Although it wasn't lunch then, it was dinner It didn't become lunch until I got away from home and someone called me uncouth for calling the noon meal dinner Still, in the way of things, it's still dinner to me. I don't know what the women talked about but lots of it must have been funny as plenty of gig-gling went on and when a fellow came in the room it grew kind of quite. I wasn't much into women's conversations anyway so I didn't hang around the kitchen much, except to see what and when to eat.

The guys would usually end up somewhere in the yard. Everyone would stand around and talk and you knew that until they hunkered down that the conversation wasn't really started good


There's several types of hunkering down. Lots of the young men would hunker with one foot beneath them and the other out front. As a fellow gets older he can't stay that way to long so a revised version is required. Then you have to use the two-footed type that will support more weight. The next type is the one and two legged type with the knees roughing the ground. This type requires that the person using them grunt and groan a bit when standing up. The last type is the flatfooted baseball squat with both hands out front. This is used exclusively by older men and base-ball players. It was satisfying for a boy to be around when men were hunkered down, I just don't know why I think it must go back to the times when men squatted around community campfires

If you are wanting to hunt on a fellow's place, then the one footed hunker is used as you won't be there too long, one way or the other. The two footed hunker will be used when buying a horse or cow from a neighbor as you will probably be there a while. After a rain, the two footed hunker is used in different degrees as some will want to stay for a while and ask everyone there how much moisture they got. Some don't stay long as they have to see that water gaps are still up.

I think that the United Nations would do a lot better, get more things decided, and just get along better if they took all the chairs out of the building and just let those people hunker down for a spell.

## **Disaster Assistance Update; Senate Action**

This week's effort to include crop loss disaster assistance for U. S. farmers as part of a Sanate FY03 Omnibus Appropriations Bill should be viewed as good news by producers adversely im-

pacted by drought and other adverse weather conditions. Unfortunately, the proposal, iniatally put forth by Senate Republican leaders, is getting less than stellar reviews from Sena-tors on both sides of the aisle. If accepted "as ia" the proposal would be added as an amendment to H. J. Resolution 2, the FY03 Omnibus Appropriations Resolution.

On the plus side of the Republican proposal is the fact that it sets aside \$3.1 billion to pay for disaster assistance. The disaster money would be part of a budget offset that creates savings through a 1.6 percent cut in spending levels for FY03 discretionary spend ing programs.

Primary criticisms, however, center on the fact that the assistance would be issued to all producers of program crops-regardless of their individual loss.

The mechanism to deliver the assistance is a supplemental payment based on a percentage of the 2002 Direct payment rate for that crop.

Plains Cotton Board Growers Board members were briefed on the proposed plan on Wednesday, January 15 and reaffirmed their position that an approach based on "traditional" disaster programs is still the best way to direct crop loss assistance to the growers that experienced these losses.

At this time the proposal, originally developed by Senate Ag Committee Chairman Thad Cochran of Mississippi, is in the pro-cess of being revised in an effort to make it more palatable to other regions. Democrat leaders are also expected to reintroduce their own disaster assistance plan for consideration.

The bottom line on disaster assistance at this time is that there are several ideas being floated, with none being universally popular. Considerations such as the USDA Farm Service Agency's ability to administer a complicated disaster program simultaneous to the signup for the Direct-Countercyclical Program(DCP), how quickly the process can be completed how the benefits are targeted, and the Administration acceptance will significantly impact the entire debate.


