Cancer Screening To Be Held In Quitaque

A breast cancer screening, sponsored by the County Extension Economics Committee and conducted by the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital, is scheduled in Silvertown on April 23, at the Briscoe County Clinic and in Quitaque on April 27, 1990 at the First United Methodist Church. The screening will be held from 10 a.m. until 2:30 p.m.

Exams are done by appointment only and may be scheduled by calling the toll-free number of the Harrington Cancer Center at 1-800-274-4673. There is a minimum number of appointments necessary before the screening will be held.

The cost may be covered by some insurance. It includes a mammogram and individual self-exam techniques. The Cancer Center will notify each participant of their results by phone and their physician will receive a copy of the mammogram report. Financial assistance is available through the Texas Cancer Council for those who qualify. Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. The Extension Home Economics Committee of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is conducting programs to promote health and wellness during the year and encourage all women 35 years of age and older to take advantage of this local health screening opportunity.

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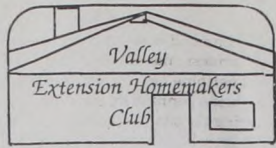

4-H News Update

County 4-H members are reminded that it's time to prepare for 4-H method demonstrations and illustrated talks. 4-H is open to boys and girls in the third grade to 19 years of age regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, religion, handicap or national origin.

Time To Order Windbreaks

A proposed windbreak planting site should be examined at least one year before the actual planting is made. This allows sufficient time to determine what land preparations are needed. Properly located windbreaks shield houses, livestock, and crops.

Conifers and evergreens form the best protection and they should be the heart of any windbreak. A angle row of evergreens about 15-20' apart

will give good protection. If space is available, a three row windbreak with two rows of evergreens and a row of shrubs or hardwoods will grow into a attractive shelter that will protect against the coldest winter winds.

The Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District will be ordering trees again in December for the citizens of Briscoe County. If you need assistance in planning a windbreak, contact the Soil Conservation Service office in Silverton, 823-2320.

Study Groups Meet To Identify Issues

Community leaders from throughout the county convened last Tuesday night in a study group meeting to identify critical issues facing the county in the future. The meeting was conducted by the Extension Program Council and the County Extension Service in preparation for writing a Long Range Extension Program to direct their educational emphasis for the next four years. This process is being carried out in each of the 254 counties in Texas.

Judge Jimmy Burson welcomed the group and expressed appreciation for their interest in the future of the county. Steve Ulrey, chairman of the Extension Program Council and president of the Quitaque Chamber of Commerce served as moderator for the meeting and introduced a panel of local leaders who discussed the county conditions.

Randy Stark, vice president of First National Bank of Quitaque, discussed the economic conditions. Retired superintendent O. C. Rampley gave an overview of the social conditions, and Rusty Henson of the Caprock Soil and Water Conservation Board reviewed the environ-

mental situation in the county. Following a break, the group was divided into four task forces which discussed issues pertaining to that group. James Griffin served as discussion leader, and Earlyne Hutsell

was recorder for the agriculture and natural resources task force. Others participating were L. B. Garvin, Jr., Bryan Burson, Joe Brannon, Rusty Henson, and Tommy Burson. Leading the home economics task

force was Linda Stark, with Norma Garcia as recorder. Participants were Kathy Kingery, Sister Barbara Potthast, Lottie Garrison, Darrah McCammon, Lana Burson, and Reverend Duane Knowlton.

Steve Ulrey was leader for the community development group, and Virginia Hardin was recorder. Other group members were: Randy Stark, Janice Hill, John T. Francis, David Brunson, Elgin Conner, Jimmy Burson, Manuel Aguilar, Gerald Smith, Aaron Younger, and Ashel McDaniel.

Leading the discussion in the youth task force was John Wyatt with Janinne Brooks as recorder. Others were Jack Shely, Perry Brunson, Margie Pinkerton, Mike Long, Carol Ramsey, and O. C. Rampley.

The group reassembled to record their identified issues as to whether they were a social, economic, or environmental concern.

Members of the Extension Program Council executive board will develop this information to write a Long Range Extension Program to be completed in the fall and distributed in December.

Conservation Plans For Erodible Land Offered

Temple, Texas—Over 60,000 conservation plans have been developed on about 13 million acres of the state's approximately 17 million acres of highly erodible cropland, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service reported today.

"We in SCS made a commitment to see that every farmer who wanted a conservation compliance plan got one by the deadline of December 31, 1989," said Texas State Conservationist Harry W. Oneth. "Farmers and ranchers themselves have made a strong commitment to soil and water conservation with these plans. In fact, they have already fully implemented plans on approximately 33 percent of the highly erodible cropland."

Highly erodible cropland without plans include situations where the land is no longer being used for cropping or where the person has

decided not to develop a plan at this time.

"Texas can be proud of the enormous conservation effort underway as a result of the conservation provisions of the Food Security Act of 1985," Oneth said.

Oneth encouraged farmers to examine their plans carefully and to be sure they understand what they've agreed to do this year. Each plan includes schedules for their installation agreed to by the producer and the local conservation district. "If farmers have questions, now's the time to call or come in and talk about it at their local SCS offices," Oneth said.

Farmers are encouraged to check with SCS when new farms or units are purchased or operators change. If a plan has been developed on the new land, now is a good time to get it implemented or revised. If there is no plan, a conservation plan will need to be developed.
