



## **Conservation Plans For Erodible Land Offered**

Temple, Texas-Over 60,000 conservation plans have been developed on about 13 million acres of the state's approximately 17 million acres of highly erodible cropland, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service reported today.

"We in SCS made a commitment to see that every farmer who wanted a conservation compliance plan got one by the deadline of December 31, 1989," said Texas State Conserva-tionist Harry W. Oneth. "Farmers andranchers themselves have made a strong commitment to soil and vater conservation with these plans. In fact, they have already fully implemented plans on approxi-mately 33 percent of the highly

erodible cropland."
Highly erodible cropland without plans include situations where the land is no longer being used for cropping or where the person has

"Texas can be proud of the

enormous conservation effort un-derway as a result of the conservation provisions of the Food Security Act of 1985," Oneth said.

Oneth encouraged farmers to examine their plans carefully and to be sure they understand what they've agreed to do this year. Each tion practices and schedules for their installation agreed to by the producer and the local conservation district. "If farmers have questions, now's the time to call or come in and talk about it at their local SCS offices," Oneth said.

Farmers are encouraged to check with SCS when new farms or units are purchased or operators change. If a plan has been developed on the new land, now is a good time to get it implemented or revised. If there is no plan, a conservationplan will need to be developed.

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
