Artist Kenneth Wyatt To Show In Quitaque

Artist Kenneth Wyatt of Tulia has experienced an extraordinary life so far—perhaps he has experienced several lives rather than one. Today he is a prolific and polished artist, best known as a Western artist. But before moving into his life as an artist, Wyatt was a Methodist minister for almost 30 years.

For Wyatt, painting is compulsive—paintings move through his mind constantly, one after another. He paints in his home with a paint-splattered television set to keep him company, and he paints by the open window in his Red River gallery, often selling his paintings right off

the easel. Wyatt has worked with pastels, watercolor, oils and in sculpting. He has produced several books, and recently completed a series of paintings of Jesus and the twelve apostles.

There is no way to predict what Kenneth Wyatt will do next, or ultimately, but it will be marked by the energy of a man constantly in motion.

There will be a special showing of Kenneth Wyatt's paintings and works of art on display in the lobby of the First National Bank of Quitaque on Monday, December 4, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The artist will be present during the day.

Caprock SWCD Taking Orders For Windbreak Trees

The Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District has begun taking orders for their annual windbreak tree sales. Orders will be taken through March 16, 1990.

A wide variety of evergreen and deciduous trees and shrubs are available to choose from. Wildlife seedling packets for quail/pheasant, deer, turkey and squirrel are also available for farmstead plantings.

Windbreak trees provide wind and snow protection as well as beautifying a homestead. These trees are also permitted to be used under certain CRP contracts as shelter or wildlife habitat.

Advanced planning must be utilized for a successful establishment of windbreaks. The installation of a drip irrigation system is highly recommended for such an establishment and is available through the Caprock SWCD. The Soil Conservation Service employees can help you in planning and designing an irrigation system to fit your tree innovation.
