Overseas Mail-Deadlines Near

With the first overseas mailing deadlines fast approaching, Post-masters Janice Timmons and Jarrell Rice are asking Turkey and Quitaque residents for a little extra help this year in making sure that holiday mail sent to military and international destinations arrives

"We would like you to mail well before the overseas holiday deadlines this year to give us extra time to arrange transportations," say Timmons and Rice.

"Last minute overseas mailing will add an even greater burden. Mailing early will give us extra time to arrange transportation, and the leeway will be especially welcome

The Postal Service issues holiday mailing deadlines every year for letters and parcels headed overseas (see chart


Surface and air mailing deadlines for military personnel stationed abroad generally range from mid-October through November, according to Timmons and Rice.

"We work in cooperation with the armed services to make sure that all mail arrives on time," say the postal officials. "Mail and morale go hand in hand, but this is especially true during the holidays.

"This year, we would really appreciate receiving mail for service men and women a week or more in advance of the deadline, to give us extra time to arrange transporta-

All military personnel stationed abraoad will benefit from early mailing, not just those in the Middle East. He encourages mailers to call their local post office about various countries' mailing restrictions and customs requirements

Outbound surface mail to the Middle East for the Military must be mailed by Nov. 3. If sent by Outbound Air Mail latest mailing dates are Nov. 16 for packages a Nov. 26 for letters. By Parcel Airlift Mail, Nov. 10 and by Space Avail able Mail Nov. 3 is last date

TAAS Test October 16,18

minimum basic skills in mathematics, reading, and writing for students in Grade 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11 (EXIT). Beginning in October, 1990 a new testing program, the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) will be implemented. The TAAS program measures a broader range of essential elements than the TEAMS program. It also addresses the academic goals of the 1990s, which stress the importance of teaching students higher -order thinking skills.

For the past five years the Texas begin its TAAS testing on October Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) has measured October 18th. The writing section of the test will be given on October 16th, reading on October 17th, and math on October 18th. Students who are absent will not be allowed to make up the test; therefore, it is essential that parents encourage their children to attend school. Students are also encouraged to perform their best on these tests.
