Alvin Stidham's family is just as puzzled today as they were the day in 1958 when he, 18 other passengers and the crew of an Army passenger plane disappeared soon after lifting off from Guam.

"I have stayed awake at night thinking about it," says a brother, Johnny Stidham of Tulia. "They had their flight pattern and they just vanished. To this day it's still a mystery to the War Department. There was no oil slick or wreekere." as no oil slick or wreckage."

From information the family has received, the brother believes

"something happened" to the aircraft shortly after takeoff. There was no correspondence from the plane after its departure.

"The family just has no idea of what happened. The War Department is confused because nine times out of 10 (with a crashed plane) times you'll find an oil slick," the brother adds. The plane's fuel tanks were full.

Johnny Stidham says "I couldn't get much information, but they fueled up in Guam and left there. They were gone probably 20 minutes and they (Guam base) couldn't get the plane on radar. It never got high enough to be picked up. 'They had a mayday and sent out search

Plane 'Never Picked Up On Radar'
Investigators told the family that if the pilot had "set it down, it would have floated 19 minutes. It had to go straight down, but if it had there would have been wreckage." Only 19 airmen were aboard the 90passenger craft.

One fate worse than instant death had been mentioned by persons familiar with the area where the plane disappeared, although the theory is "a long shot."

"They say the plane could have reached an island," Johnny says.
"There are islands all around Guam, and some were inhabited by
natives, who was called 'head hunters.' If they got you, you wouldn't get

One thing the brother knows: "They were flying top secret."

The West Texas farm boy and his best military friend, "Peachy," who picked up that nickname because his home was the peach state of Georgia, went down together. "Peachy" had been a visitor several times

'Eerie' Feeling At Funeral
Johnny said there was an "eerie" feeling at a memorial service for
Alvin at the First Assembly of God Church in Tulia, "because there was
no body. A military honor guard was sent here."

Alvin Allen Stidham was only 17 when he completed the first phase of his basic military training at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio.

He also trained at Cannon Air Force Base in Clovis, N.M.

Although he enlisted for a four-year hitch in the Air Force, the youthful Stidham had been in the military "about a year" at the time of his disappearance. His family believes he is dead, but this could not be

The teenager was from a family of nine sons and two daughters born to James Lee Sr. and Delores Stidham. He and Adrian were one of four sets of twins in their family.

sets of twins in their family.

Five brothers served in the military, four of them being "in at the same time." This was during the Korean Conflict era.

The oldest of the Stidham brothers who saw military duty was James Lee Jr. (Jim), who served in the U.S. Army infantry and was in combat in Korea. He attained the rank of first sergeant.

His basic training was received at Fort Ord, Calif.

Next was Johnny Ray Stidham, who was involved in "troop movement" with the transportation division. He was assigned to the

Movement with the transportation division. He was assigned to the 501st Motor Pool, headquartered at Fort Lee, Va.

He started training at Fort Sill, Okla., and then went to Fort Meade, Maryland, and then to Fort Lee, where he took basic training. He also receiving training in North Carolina.

In his duties, "a lot of times we were on the road. My bunk sometimes went three weeks without me sleeping in it." His duty sometimes took

him "overseas."

When Johnny was discharged from the active Army, he was in the 
"ready reserve for five years," working out of Fort Sam Houston in

Brother number three in the service was Blacky Stidham, who

Adrain, Alvin's twin, was assigned to Frankfurt, Germany, at one time. He took basic traning at Fort Dix, New Jersey.

Tragedy in the family of Mr. and Mrs. Stidham--who moved their family "from East Texas, between Troup and Jacksonville, to Quitaque about 1946" and later Tulia--was not confined to Alvin.

Jim, who worked for an oil company for years and continue to climb the ladder of success prior to his death of a heart attack. Adrain was 'killed in a car wreck between Tyler and Jacksonville, Tex., after his discharge from the military.

That leaves only two of the Stidham brothers who saw military alive.



Summer time means more play time for children and an increased need for high-energy nacks, says a nutritionist at the JSDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center.

"Parents can reinforce good eating habits this summer by providing their children with plenty of healthy treats," says Dr. Corinne Montandon, an assistant professor of nutrition at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

By giving some thought to snack selection, Montandon believes parents can meet their children's dietary needs while sending a positive nutritional

massage.

Instead of stocking the kitchen with chips, cakes, sodas and other high-fat convenience foods, she recommends the following summer snacks: frozen low-fat yogurt, fresh fruits and fruit juices, frozen orange wedges, banana slices or grapes. (Grapes and other small snack foods should not be offered to children younger than 5 because they chould choke).

mild discomfort to life-threatening

When it's both hot and humid, body to release the heat that builds up," said Lowell Johnson, M.D., family physician on staff at Methodist Hospital. "As a result, the body temperature begins to climb. Initially, this might cause mild discomfort-headache, dizziness and fatigue are typical

Following are the three degrees of heat stress, how to recognize them and prevention techniqu

"Heat cramps Represents the mildest form of heat stress. They are most often seen in poorly conditioned athletes who drink inadequate amounts of liquid before and during exercise. Symptoms included painful muscle servers are several to the manner of the servers muscle spasms and sweaty skin. To relieve heat cramps, sit or lie down in a cool area. Drink cool water and stretch cramped

\*Heat exhaustion-Results when heat stress produces excessive fluid loss. Heat exhaustion causes nausea, vomiting headache, muscle aches, dizziness rapid pulse, thirst and clammy or pale skin. When heat exhaustion is mild, the treatment is the same as for heat cramps. However, if vomiting, confusion or headache ersists, gently apply wet towels

and call for emergency help.

\*Heatstroke-Heat exhaustion can rapidly lead to heatstroke, a condition in which the temperature regulating center in the brain fails. At this point, the body temperature soars, leading to severe and even fatal brain, liver or kidney damage. A person experiencing heatstroke may lose consciousness. If conscious, symp-toms include confusion, a staggered walk and agitation. Other symptoms include hot, dry skin (rarely sweating) and a body temperature of 105 degrees Fahrenheit or more. A person experiencing heatstroke should be moved to a reclining position in a cool area. Emergency help should be called immediately. If the person is conscious, cool sips of

by Mary Jane Shanes, Social Security manager in Plainview

When a person who gets Social Security or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) checks is unable to manage benefits in his or her own best interest, the Social Security Administration appoints a representative payee to assume these responsibilities. In these cases, the Social Security or SSI benefits are sent directly to the representative payee. The payee takes care of using funds for the personal care and wellbeing of the beneficiary and agrees to report certain changes in the beneficiary's circumstances that could effect the continuing

eligibility to receive benefits.
Social Security representatives often come across situations where family member have worked out other agreements for handling the benefit checks of a family member. Joint bank accounts and power-of-attorney agreements are common methods used to allow one member of a family to control funds belonging to another family member.

Such common practices are, managing Social Security benefits. While joint bank accounts and powers-of-attorney may be convenient ways to pay bills, they do not provide for the responsibility and accountability that Social Security requires.

If the beneficiary is unable to manage benefits, applying to be the representative payee is the most appropriate step for a responsible family member to take. A payee will be appointed only if medical and other evidence establishes that the beneficiary cannot manage his or her own finances because of severe mental or physical

limitations.

Another misconception Social Security representatives run into is the belief that legal guardianship is a sufficient basis for managing someone else's benefits. If a Social Security or SSI beneficiary has a legal guardian, the legal guardian or close family member should apply to be the representative payee. The accounting that a guardian makes to the court does not cover all of the aspects of responsibility required from a representative payee.

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

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

#### Teacher Retirement **Annuitants Sought**

The Teacher Retirement System of Texas is looking for former annuitants---widows or widowers of deceased members or retirees--whose survivor benefits stopped when they remarried prior to 1980. A new Texas law has now restored their

State law previously required that benefits stop when a surviving spouse remarried. That law was changed in September 1980 permitting benefits, in future years, to continue for surviving spouses who remarried; however those who had alreadylost benefits before that date were not included.

The 73rd Texas Legislature this spring rectified that inequity and passed House Bill 2711 restoring payments to those beneficiaries whose benefits stopped when they

TRS, however, does not have record of these individuals since their names were dropped from the system database when their benefits ended 13 or more years ago. The retirement system is looking for these individuals so that benefits can be restored to them.

Persons who believe they qualify to have survivor benefits restored should contact the Claim Department of the Teacher Retirement System for information on how to apply. The new law will be effective September 1, 1993. Payments can begin after that date and within one month after an application is filed
