 - 1/2 c. grated Parmesan cheese
- Pour onto this mixture.
 - 2 1/4 c. scalded heavy cream



Stir well. Fill shell with mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. When cus- tard is set, scatter 1/2 lb. crisp bacon pieces on top. Sprinkle with chopped parsley.

CANNED GRAVY PERKS UP HUMDRUM HOLIDAY MEALS



When the holidays arrive they always bring an endless string of extra little chores to add to your already full schedule.

With cookies to bake, presents to buy and wrap, and rounds of parties to plan and attend, you often shortchange your family when mealtime rolls around.

| 1 pound thinly sliced veal cutlet (3/4-inch thick) | 2 tablespoons shortening |
| 2 slices (2 ounces) Swiss cheese | 1 can (10 1/2 ounces) mushroom gravy |
| 1/4 cup green pepper strips | Generous dash chervil |
| | Cooked noodles |

Cut veal into 4 pieces (about 5x4"). Pound with meat hammer or edge of heavy saucer. Place 3/4 slice of cheese on each piece. Roll up; tuck in ends and fasten with skewers or toothpicks. In skillet, brown roll-ups and cook green pepper in shortening. Pour off fat. Add gravy and chervil. Cover; cook over low heat 45 minutes. Stir now and then. Serve over noodles. Makes 4 servings.
