Queens Sign Valley Star

Plainview: Eva Cheatham, who sparked Valley High (Quitque-Turkey) to three straight district titles and a spot in the state tournament twice, will play for the Wayland Flying Queens next year, Coach Dean Weese has announced. The 5-10 post-forward averaged 22 points a game in 1974-75 as the Patriots finished 31-4, losing in the regional semifinals to Nazareth. They lost to Grandview in the state semifinals in a 32-7 season two years ago after falling to the same school, 39-37 in the state finals in 1972-73. The three-time all-district selection who is considered by Weese a fine all-around player and good outside shooter, scored 45 points against Quail this past year for Dave Sanders' team. She started at Quitque as a freshman before the school was consolidated with Turkey. She is salutatorian of her graduating class.

Brother Of Aubrey Turner Dies

Mr. A. B. Turner, 78, brother of Aubrey Turner, died in Clifton Hospital on May 13 at 2:00 p.m. Mr. Turner was born in Bosque County, Texas. Services were held at Clifton Funeral Home on May 15 at 10:30 a.m., with a Methodist pastor officiating. Survivors include his wife, Lina; two sisters, Ora Huckaby and Edith Younger, both of Amarillo. The three brothers are Aubrey of Turkey, Oscar of Amarillo and F. E. of Arlington.

Funeral Held Tuesday For Loran Denton

Funeral services were held Tuesday in Memphis for Hall County Judge Loran Denton, 61, former superintendent of schools at Turkey and later Valley School, the Turkey-Quitque Consolidated School District. Mr. Denton died about 6 o'clock Sunday morning in Hall County Hospital in Memphis. Mr. Denton suffered a heart attack Friday afternoon about 1:30 as he was returning to work following lunch. According to reports, he suffered two more attacks before succumbing Sunday morning. Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church in Memphis at 4:00 p.m. with the pastor, Rev. Clyde Murphey, officiating. Burial was in the IOOF Cemetery at Lakeview by Spicer Funeral Home.

James Loran Denton was born March 25, 1914 in Bosque County, Texas and came with his parents to Hall County in 1925, and had lived in Hall County since that time. He graduated from the Lesley Schools, then earned a Bachelor and Masters degree at West Texas State in Canyon, and also attended Texas Tech University. Mr. Denton spent 39 years of his life in school work, teaching and administering. He taught at Lakeview and Deep Lake, served 13 years as superintendent of schools at Lakeview, moving from there to Turkey where he was superintendent for 16 years, then served for two years as superintendent of the Valley Schools following the Turkey and Quitque consolidation.

Mr. Denton was voted into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame several years ago. He was tennis coach at Turkey High School for many years and his tennis teams won several state championships under his coaching.

He was elected to the office of Hall County Judge last November and had served in that capacity since January of this year. Loran Denton had always been very active in all phases of school and community life. He was a member of the Baptist Church and he served the churches and communities well wherever the family lived. He will be missed by many people.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Dwain Walker of Happy; two sons, Royce of Webster, New York and Dennis of Turkey; three sisters, Mrs. Byron Todd of Waterford, California, Mrs. C. H. Williams of Shamrock and Mrs. W. J. Kleinpeter of Amarillo; five brothers, F. L. Denton of Goodnight, John Denton of Gruver, Clarence Denton of Floydada, Charles Denton of Grand Island, Nebraska and Dale Denton of Amarillo; and nine grandchildren.

Donors are needed to replace blood given to Mrs. J. A. Burk recently in High Plains Baptist Hospital. Mrs. Burk is the mother of Jimmie Sue Mullin.

Healthy persons between the ages of 17 and 66 are generally accepted as blood donors. Disqualifying conditions include a history of hepatitis at any age, pregnancy or major surgery within the past six months, weight less than 110 pounds, and a history of unarrested tuberculosis.

By becoming a blood donor you and your immediate family are covered for any blood center charges that you may incur within the next six months.

About 80 donors are needed and it only takes 20 to 30 minutes of your time. There is no substitute for blood. Only through your donations can blood be replaced.

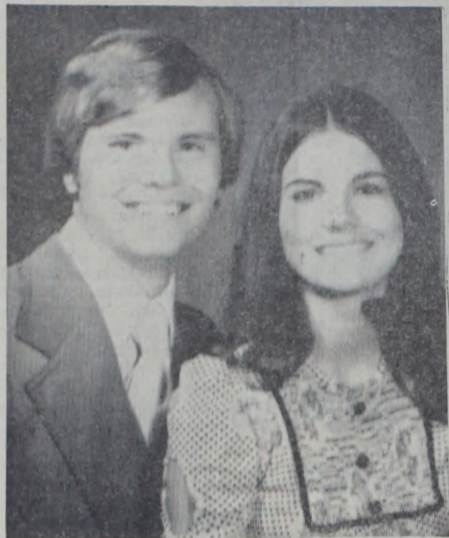

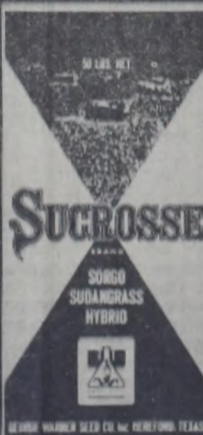

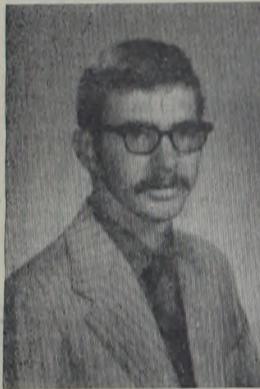

The worst is over . . . probably. Statements like this have become the most common hedge in the cattle industry in the past few weeks as top executives of the beef business find reason to be cautiously optimistic in the face of rising per capita consumption and a decrease in the industry's number one problem, glut. Caused by a combination of price controls, natural cattle cycle (cattle population reaches a cyclical peak every 10-11 years) and high feed prices, glut (over-supply) seemed for a while to be unending. Consumers are solving the problem by buying more beef and accepting grass-fed meat. Packers buying grass-fed cattle have to use two or three of the young pasture-fed cattle to produce as much meat as a single grain-fed animal. So the problem seems to be solving itself, but even the optimistic cattlemen (not the easiest thing to find) say it will take at least 18 months before the industry is back to normal.

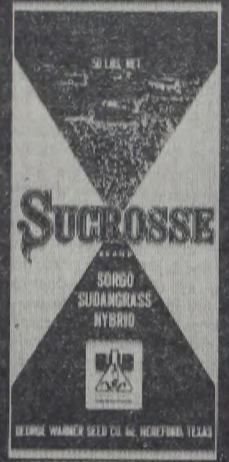

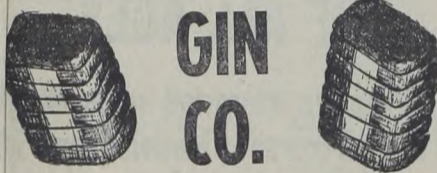
