by Walter Wayne Taylor I know I'm not old enough to have had that much experience with death, at the the same time it is not something that comes at a certain age like a driver's license. Several things lately have caused this article. (The deaths of) J. P. Taylor, Don Ewing, Jan Merrell, and Jeff Piper: my uncle, my principal, a schoolmate's wife, a fellow teacher and several things I have read lately.

I know after Fat's death for awhile I wondered, how can people around me keep acting like things are still the same. They aren't. The same was true when Mr. Ewing died. This time the feeling was stronger because I went to school every day and that was a reminder. I still think of Mr. Ewing most everyday. Something unrelated to education triggers the thought. I don't think it matters what triggers the thought, the important thing is the thought. I think Mr. Ewing, rather than Don, because that is what I called him during school hours.

I did not know Jan Merrell very well, Her death effected me because she was the wife of a schoolmate, she had children in the same grades as mine. I could not help but think how this would have affected me if Kathy had died. This went through my mind a

A week and a half later Jeff died. I was the first adult to get to his classroom. After deciding to give CPR, and that not working, I was a teacher that CARED for his students. We would talk about ways to improve things for the student's benefit. I also looked up to his relationship with the students. I do not think this relationship hurt what he wanted to accomplish in the class, if anything it helped. I feel a great loss.

Soon after Jeff's death, I read something in the paper. The person writing did not want people to avoid talking of the dead. The writer wanted to know that you hadn't forgotten their loved one. Then, right after this, our church newsletter talked of grief train-

Now, to what I want to ask with this article. Is it true? To those of you that have had people close to you die, do/did you want other's to speak of them? Or at the very least, want others not to try to speak of them? Did that make sense? Do/did you get the idea that your friends are/were trying not to speak of your (spouse, parents, child, etc). Does/did this make you feel better, or does/did this make you feel that your friends are/were trying to forget them, deny their existance

I have no idea how I would feel under those circumstances. I do know that I speak of Jeff often. And now that I think of it, I don't recall hearing anyone else using his name. I would think that if my (wife, parent, etc.) died, I would want to talk of them. And perhaps, if no one would bring up their name, I would not either. Help me out here. How do/did you want your friends to act

around you at the time and after time has passed? Thanks for the help. I think Eunice can make a good column out of your replies.





Friday, March 26, 1993, Valley FFA Students will enter judging contests at West Texas State University. On Saturday the students will be in competition at Clarendon Junior College in



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
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
