

# Are You Eligible To Vote By Mail?

Did you know that registered voters in Texas are eligible to vote by mail if: (a) The voter expects to be absent from the county of the voter's residence on election day and during the regular hours

for conducting early voting at the early voting polling place;

(b) If the voter has a sickness or physical condition that prevents the voter from appearing at the polling place on election

(c) If the voter is over 65 years of age or older on election day;
(d) At the time the voter's early voting ballot application is submitted, the voter is confined in jail.

To be entitled to vote an early voting ballot by mail, a person who is eligible for early voting must make an application for an early voting ballot to be voted by mail as provided by the law An application may be obtained from the office of the early voting clerk or you may download an application form the Secretary of State website at http://www.sos.state.tx.us/elections/voter/ earlyvoting.shtml. Click on "Application for Ballot by Mail Adobe PDF" and click on "County" for early voting clerk address. Be sure and read the instructions on the application carefully and fill in all blanks applicable.

An application must be submitted to the early voting clerk by (1) Mail; (2) Common or contract carrier; or (3) Fax, if the applicant is absent from the county; (4) Personal delivery (If submitted not later than the close of regular business in the clerk's office on the day before the first day of the period for early voting by personal appearance.

Applications for a ballot by mail must be submitted to the early voting clerk on or after the 60th day before election day and before the close of business on the 7th day before election day This is not a postmark date, the application must be in the hands of your early voting clerk by the 7th day before the election. Remember you will need to allow ample time for mail delivery of your application to the clerk, mailed ballot from the clerk to you and your voted ballot mailed back to the early voting clerk.

October 29, 2002 is the last day for the Briscoe County Clerk's office to accept applications for a ballot by mail in the November 5th General Election. Remember you will need to allow ample time for mail delivery of your application to the clerk, mailed ballot from the clerk to you and your voted ballot mailed back to the early voting clerk

Clif Yeary rushed for 208 yards and Derrick Cruse accounted for six touchdowns to lead the Patriots to a 74-31 victory over the Aspermont Hornets last Friday night. Robert Mendoza pitched in with 107 yards rushing to put him over 100 yards in both Valley games this season

Cruse caught three touchdown passes from Justin Wlks, who threw for 90 yards, and rushed for two touchdowns. Cruse also threw a 25 yard touchdown pass to JC Pigg, who scored his second touchdown of the season

"Derrick does everything for our team," Coach Bret Tyler said. "He runs, throws, catches, tackles, blocks. He's a very complete

Yeary's 208 yards were produced on just 13 carries as he scored three times, twice on runs of more than 50 yards. Mendoza got almost half of his rushing total on his only touchdown of the night, a 51 yard romp in the fourth quarter

"We've never shied away from saying that we have three quality running backs." Tyler said. "All three of them are capable of putting up big numbers, but all three are also excellent blockers and defensive players.

Rodney Fuston was nearly flawless in leading the offensive line to a dominating performance. Ramiro Ramos, JC Pigg, and Douglas Payne also helped clear the way for the scoring barrage. Albert Espinoza and Francisco Rodriguez helped clear the way with their blocking from the fullback spot.

"Frank was impressive," Tyler said. "All the full backs got big blocks, as did Wilks, but we were impressed with him. He stepped up to Varsity and produced.

On the defensive side of the ball Clif Yeary accounted for 16 tackles and recovered two fumbles. Cruse tallied nine tackles, and Mendoza and Wilks each had 6. Mendoza and Manuel Chavez each recovered a fumble for the Patriots as well.

"Our defense gave up too many points early" Tyler said. "But they stepped it up in the second half and proved we can play de-

In JV action, Fidel Valdez touched the football three times and scored all three times to lead the Patriots to a crushing 46-0 win over the Hornets.

Next Mike Peters, from PRPC, Panhandle Regional Planning



# TSSWCB Postpones Adoption Of Proposed **Changes To Brush Control Program Rules**

At the State Board meeting of the Texas State Soil and Water Conser vation Board (TSSWCB) on Thursday, August 29, 2002, the Board decided to postpone the adoption of the proposed changes to the Brush Control Program rules at this time.

After discussing the comments received at the public hearings and reviewing letters that had been received by various individuals expressing concern regarding the changes, the Board chose to take no final action on the proposed rules at this meeting. Instead the Board directed TSSWCB staff to address all the comments received and come back at the September Board Meeting with a recommendation as to how to proceed with the proposed program rules changes.

The Board also authorized the Executive Director to sign an Inter

agency Contract between the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) and the TSSWCB. This contract enables the TSSWCB to receive the \$15 million in Agricultural Water Conservation bond money that was granted to TSSWCB during the last legislative session for brush control cost share

The next TSSWCB State Board meeting is scheduled for September 20, 2002, at TSSWCB headquarters in Temple, Texas. The State Board is made up of five members, elected by Soil and W ater Conservation Districts. The TSSWCB is a state agency that administers T exas' soil and water conservation law and coordinates Texas' soil and water conservation programs around the state.

# Disaster Aid: Yes, No Or Maybe?

Advocating the need for disaster assistance is usually an uphill battle in Congress and the effort to secure a Crop Loss Disaster assistance package to offset weather related financial losses incurred in 2001 and 2002

has proven maybe more complicated than most.

Given the fact that efforts to secure the assistance have run parallel with the effort to secure passage of a new farm bill, the road to a 2001-2002 Crop Loss Disaster Program has had more than its share of detours and unexpected turns.

For the producers depending on the disaster program to shore up severely injured farm finances there is an understandable feeling that disaster assistance needed to be completed yesterday. For the non-agricultural members of Congress who have a hard time seeing the differences in a backward looking Crop Loss Disaster Program and the forward looking assistance implemented through the authority of the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 the earlier phases of the debate were not how to get both but who is the control of the contro not how to get both, but why do you need a disaster program if we are writing a new Farm Bill to provide a safety net.

Folks involved in agriculture see clearly that without a Disaster Pro-

gram there will be producers who will not be able to utilize the safety net provided by the new Farm Bill.

Rhetoric and misunderstanding have played a big part in the confusion. What has never wavered, however, is the commitment of Plains Cotton Growers to find a way to deliver not just one or the other, but both. In many cases the tactical decisions made to secure the best position

for achieving the dual goal of getting a new Farm Bill and also winning passage of a supplemental Crop Loss Disaster Program have been misin-

terpreted and seen as a putting aside of one in favor of the other.

Efforts to move disaster assistance have been a top priority since the signing of the Farm Bill May 13. Those efforts have finally begun to get to a stage where debate and votes will take place. As early as next week the Senate is expected to vote on an amendment to the Interior Department Appropriations Bill that includes Crop and Livestock Disaster Assistance for 2001 and 2002.

With the midterm election season heating up and the fact both Demo crat and Republican leadership have voiced support for a Disaster Assistance Program the odds that something will get done are improving.

The unknown answer at this time, and the point on which much of the political push and shove will come, is how a Disaster Program would be

For producers who need the assistance the bottom-line is that they probably don't really care how it gets done, either through so-called budget offsets or through emergency funding, as long as it gets done.

funds, many additional rural businesses and communities will be able to improve their local economic conditions and create more jobs in rural ar eas, "said Under Secretary for Rural Development, Tom Dorr." President
Bush and our team at Rural Development believe in our rural entrepreneurs and are working to foster these efforts."
Funding provided through USDA Rural Development's Business Op-

portunity Grants and Economic Development Loan and Grant Programs will assist over 455 businesses and create or save nearly 3,00 jobs in 24 states. With total economic projects in the 24 states totaling over \$3.1

One of the Grants awarded through the Rural Business Opportunity Grant (RBOG) Program will be Texas A&M "Investigate the Growth of the Texas Cattle Feeding" at Amarillo, Texas. \$48,936 in grant funds will be used to conduct a feasibility study to determine where a new slaughterhouse facility should be located in the Texas Panhandle

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

# EXCESS NITRATE IN QUITAQUE WATER

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that nitrite poses an acute health concern at certain levels of exposure. This inorganic chemical is used in fertilizers and is found in sewage and wastes from humans and/or farm animals and generally gets into drinking water as a result of these activities. While excessive levels of nitrate in drinking water have not been observed, other sources of nitrate have caused serious illness in infants and sometimes death in infants under six months of age. The serious illness in infants is caused because nitrite interferes with the oxygen carrying capacity of the child's blood. This in an acute disease in that symptoms of the child's blood. This in an acute disease in that symptoms of the child's blood. toms can develop rapidly. However, in most cases, health deteriorates over a period of days. Symptoms include shortness of breath and blueness of the skin. Clearly, expert medical advice should be sought immediately if these symptoms occur.

The purpose of this notice is to encourage parents and other responsible parties to provide infants with an alternate source of drinking water. Local and state health authorities are the best source of information concerning alternate sources of drinking water for infants. EP A has set concerning alternate sources of drinking water for infants. EP A has set the drinking water standard at 10 part per million (ppm) for nitrate to protect against the risk of these adverse effects. EP A has also set a drinking water standard for nitrite at 1 ppm. To allow for the fact that the toxicity of nitrate and nitrite are additive,, EP A has also established a standard for the sum of nitrate and nitrite at 10 ppm. Drinking water that meets the EPA standard is associated with little to none of this risk and is considered safe with respect to nitrate.

**BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENT OF PROPOSED** CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT Special Election NOVEMBER 5, 2002

Explanatory Brief for HJR 2
HJR 2 would amend the constitution to allow the commissioners court of a county to declare the office of constable dormant if that office has been vacant for at least seven consecutive years. The records of a constable office that is declared dormant will be transferred to the county clerk. If the office is declared dormant, the previous office-holder does not continue to hold the office. The office may not be filled by election or appointment unless the commissioners court votes to reinstate the office or a majority of votes cast in an election held on the issue favor reinstatement. The reinstatement election may be held if the commissioners court on its own motion orders such an election, or the reinstatement election signed by 10% of the registered voters of the constable precinct. The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioners court of a county to declare the office of constable in a precinct to be dormant if the office has not been filled by election or appointment for a lengthy period and providing a procedure for the reinstatement of the office.


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
