The compromise bill was the work of the Joint Com mittee on Farm Worker Insurance and represented more than two years of the Special Legislative Ses sion this summer along with school reform and a tax bill. The new legislation removes the current exemp. tion for farm and ranch aborers and now provides workers compensation for laborers who are migrant workers, seasonal workers employed on a truck farm orchard or vineyard or em ployed by an employer whose gross annual payroll or the preceeding year exceeds $\$ 25,000$, adjustable each year for inflation. The coverage also extends to farm or ranch laborers employed by an employer whose gross annual payroll or the proceding year ex 87. $\$ 50.000$ for 1988.90

The primary responsibility The primary responsibility
for workers' complasation coverage is with the labor agent. If the labor agent or crew chiet - does not provide coverage, then the person wir whom is jabor and severally liable with the labor agent in an action to ecover damages for per onal injuries or death suf sonal imjuries or death sut If migrant or seasonal workers are covered by a workers compensation insurance policy, the owner or operator of the property on which the workers perform arm or ranch labor is not riable in a separate action or injury compensable under that policy, except in instances of gross negligence.
A labor agent must notify each person with whom he contracts of whether he subscribes to workers compensation insurance and must provid any coverage.
