Most Farm Program Payments Completed in County

Most of the farmers who participated in the 1970 wheat, feed grain and cotton programs in Briscoe County have now received their program payments, according to Louie Kitchens, chairman of the Briscoe County ASC Committee.

Farmers earn program payments by diverting portions of their cropland to conservation uses, and complying with other program requirements. Diverting unneeded cropland helps maintain a balance between supply and demand, preserves the excess acres for future use when they are needed, provides a more orderly supply of farm products to consumers, and helps to assure equitable prices to farmers.

Throughout the nation, over three million farmers earned the farm program payments. Payments were disbursed during a six-week period beginning July 1. In past years, the payment period has extended over a three-month period from July through September.

Compressing the payment period into half the normal time required close cooperation between farmers and ASCS personnel, Mr. Kitchens said, adding: "Speaking for the entire farmer-elected committee, I am proud of the way everyone has cooperated to get the payments out early as we had promised farmers that we would do." Because of budget restraints, partial payments could not be made this year during the spring sign-up period for the feed grain program. When this decision was made, the Department told farmers that full payments would be made as early as possible. That commitment has now largely been fulfilled.

'CLEAN-UP WEEK' SLATED AT QUITAQUE POST OFFICE

Postmaster Jarrell Rice announced "Clean-Up Week" for the Quitaque Post Office as part of a nation-wide postal activity announced in Washington by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount.

The Postmaster General announced the program "to establish post offices as a symbol of good housekeeping and as a credit to every community in the nation."

Locally, Postmaster Rice said "Clean-Up Week" will focus on such matters as repainting the exterior of the Post Office, polishing the floors and cleaning all desks and cabinets.

"We are all concerned nowadays about the quality of the environment," he said, and the Post Office—as a representative of the Federal Government—is always pleased to conduct activities that are in the best interests of the communities we serve.

"Our Post Office is one of the busiest and most visible activities in Quitaque and whatever we can do to improve it is of special value to our community."

The Postmaster pointed out that in addition to improved appearance for postal facilities, this is designed to provide practical values, removal of safety and health hazards designed to reduce accident and illness, and repairs wherever feasible.

The Postmaster General has said, Postmaster Rice noted, that while the most intensive effort will occur during the designated week, he expects a post office to maintain improvement programs as a permanent activity "that will give a new look to the postal service for customers and employees alike."

AOUAD HUNTING SEASON MOVED TO NOVEMBER
 Sportsmen who have stalked the sharp-eyed aoudad sheep over the

Palo Duro Canyon's cliffs and ledges still may be subject to skinned knees and sore muscles—but this year frostbite won't likely be one of the hazards.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has moved the open season from January to November and has increased the length of the season by two days.

This year, hunters may take one sheep by permit only from November 14-20 in the Panhandle Regulatory District.

The hardy sheep were first stocked in the canyon area in the winter of 1957-58, when 44 animals from a New Mexico ranch were released.

The exotic sheep, natives of the Atlas Mountains of North Africa, apparently found the rocky landscape to their liking. Census efforts have indicated a stable population of at least 600 animals in the half-million acre area.

The season change was not made entirely for hunter comfort, however. Pierce B. Uzzell, wildlife coordinator for the Department, said the November hunt will provide more biological information about the population and food habits of the herd.

In addition, the aoudad sheep appears to be one species which reproduces virtually all year, although a few more lambs than usual have been seen during March, April and May.

Helicopters have provided a means for counting the animals with accuracy which would have been impossible otherwise. The aoudads unerringly seek the most rugged and inaccessible portions of the available habitat for their home, the census efforts have shown.

The Panhandle Regulatory District is the only district in Texas

in which the State has stocked the aoudads. But private stocking by ranchers in the Hill Country and in the Davis Mountains have made the aoudad one of Texas' most populous exotics.

The tawny brown animals are truly big-game animals, with the male of the species attaining a height at the shoulder of more than 40 inches and a weight of 320 pounds. The females are smaller, but both sexes have the characteristic curving horns which make the species a desirable trophy.

Shirttail Sermon

The fifth commandment reads, "Honor thy father and thy mother." This commandment given by God to His people some three thousand years ago speaks of needed relationships during a twentieth century of turmoil. Contemporary Christians have good reason to heed this command from God.

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in the sense of condoning it! Sometimes honor might mean displaying a loving concern. "Children who honor their parents will never cease to care."

Third, we should honor our parents because we will, as adults, benefit from it. What man can claim to be so wise as to never benefit from the counsel of his elders? The prudent man will do well to consider the remarks of his parents, and in so doing he will honor them.

Fourth, we should honor our parents because it is meaningful to them. "Elaborate floral wreaths and a profusion of tears are poor substitutes for respect and honor for your parents while they are with you." God commands it; we must obey.

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR15)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(a) The State Building Commission is created and succeeds to the powers and duties heretofore vested in the agency of the same name by this Constitution and to the powers and duties the Legislature has vested or may vest in the Commission. Its membership shall consist of three Texas citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The term of each member shall be six years except in the first appointments to the Commission the Governor shall appoint one member for two

years, one for four years, one for six years, and thereafter one member biennially. The Governor shall biennially designate one member as Chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission."

 Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30)
 General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13) Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature.

"B. Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligible for retirement benefits under the laws of this state providing for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired and any person holding an office named in that paragraph who is not eligible for retirement benefits under such laws may be removed from office, for disability seriously interfering with the perform-

ance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

"(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to the misconduct or disability of particular persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) After such investigation as it deems necessary, the Commission may in its discretion issue a private reprimand, or if the Commission determines that the situation merits such action, it may order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal, or retirement of a person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefor, it shall issue an order of public censure or it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal, or retirement, as the case may be, of the person in question holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order public censure, retirement or removal, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the

recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary."

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of, the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR32) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a

home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary renting of the homestead shall not change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale."

Internationally famous racing pilot, Bill Brodbeck, flying the record-setting Lark Commander, N1970L, recently set three new flight records for light aircraft during a continuous 6 1/2 hour flight.

Built by Aero Commander, one of the General Aviation Divisions of North American Rockwell (NR), the 4-place, 180-h.p., production model Lark, claimed the records flying over Eastern Seaboard courses. The record flight originated in Albany, Ga., and concluded at the 21st annual Reading, Pa., Air Show, where Brodbeck and his Lark were greeted by an enthusiastic crowd of spectators, and (L to R) Victor Yarnell, the mayor of Reading; (Brodbeck); Col. Health Hints

Children and Pets

A dog might be a man's best friend, but it can be a danger to your small child. Caution your child not to tease, make threatening gestures, or remove food or toys from an animal. When approaching a dog, your child should always speak to avoid startling the pet. Don't allow a small child to lead a large dog. Make sure your child is not allergic to dogs. Have your dog immunized against rabies as soon as possible.



First-Aid Kits

Emergencies are unpredictable. Don't be caught without adequate first-aid supplies in your home or car. Be sure your medicine cabinet and your portable first-aid kit include the following items: individual package-type sterile dressings for open wounds or burns; adhesive bandages; roller bandages for fingers and for holding dressings in place; adhesive tape; triangular bandage for sling, dressing, or covering; safety pins; blunt-tip scissors; tweezers; measuring spoon; eye dropper; splints; tourniquet; mild soap for cleansing wounds, scratches, and cuts; essential personal prescriptions; and a first-aid guidebook.



Medical Tags

People who have medical conditions requiring special attention in an emergency should wear medical identification tags. Made of either plastic or metal, the tags can be worn around the wrist, ankle, or neck. A tag identifies the medical condition and sometimes gives names and phone numbers of the nearest kin and family physician. Among those who should wear emergency medical identification tags are diabetics, epileptics, people with regular needs for prescribed medicine, and persons with drug allergies.
