Briscoe County Budgets Lower Attorney Salary

Briscoe County Commissioners kept the 1988 tax rate of .4150 per \$100 valuation when they met in a special meeting September 19. Commissioners also approved a budget of \$589,873 for 1989. Commissioner Jack Chandler, Precinct 2, thought he could put the controversy to rest by proposing that the 1988 salary and funding for the secretary and office expenses be reinstated. The motion died for lack of a second.

Commissioners lowered the county attorney's salary for 1989 to \$4,800, the approximate 1972 level. County Judge Jimmy M. Ross cast the deciding vote in the 3-2 decision. Commissioners

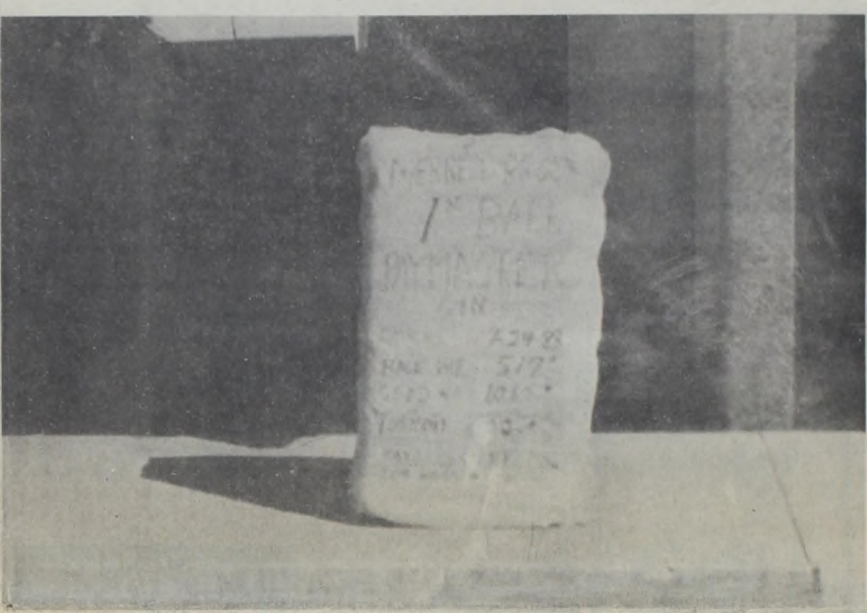
Chandler and Bryant Eddleman of Precinct 4, voted "no" on the issue while Commissioners Shafe Weaver, Precinct 1, and L. B. Garvin, Precinct 3, voted "yes." Commissioners also rejected spending \$4,500 for a part-time secretary and \$500 for office expenditures.

According to the Plainview Herald, write-in candidate and the only person running for county attorney, Sharon Sutton Pigg, who is a Lubbock lawyer, stated that the salary decrease was an attempt to get her to withdraw from the race. Judge Ross denied the allegation saying that "The court doesn't know what the needs of that office are going

to be and it felt like it didn't make good sense to set a budget without knowing what will be needed. We pinch every penny twice in this county and this was an attempt to keep a close watch on it." Mrs. Pigg said that she would present budget requirements to the Commissioners following the general election in November.

Noting the financial condition of Briscoe County, Ross said commissioners had been placed in a difficult position because they don't know how Mrs. Pigg will operate the office.

Following the meeting, Ross said that the budget could be amended once Mrs. Pigg is elected.

Hospital Task Force Comes To Turkey

The campaign to Save-The-Hall County Hospital continues as the October 11 deadline draws near. As of Monday at noon, \$225,000 had been raised, according to Jay Campbell. That is almost half of the goal of \$500,000.

A meeting for the citizens of Turkey is set for Tuesday, October 4, at 7:30 p.m., at the Bob Wills Center. "Turkey residents are urged to attend and to support the county hospital. This is a vital part of our county and citizens need to fight to maintain it. The hospital tax that passed recently will remain in effect whether the hospital remains open or not, some may not be aware of that," says Campbell. "That's why it is so important for the people of Turkey to attend this meeting. No company or business will consider moving into a community or county without a hospital."

A consignment auction is planned for Saturday, October 8, at the Old Golden Spread Irrigation Building in Memphis. Everyone in Hall and Donley Counties are asked to contribute to and attend this auction.

All proceeds will go the Save-The-Hospital fund. For more information call James Chappel, 259-2511, or Buddy Bobbett, 259-2225. In Clarendon, call Eldon Thomas at 874-3814.

A city-wide meeting was held in Clarendon on Tuesday night with the Task Force of Memphis to inform Donley County residents of the hospital needs.

If funds cannot be raised, the Hall County Hospital will close its doors on November 1, 1988.

The Task Force will be on hand to answer questions on Tuesday, October 4, 7:30 p.m., at the Bob Wills Center.

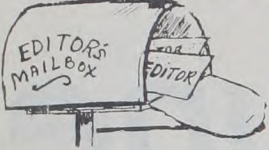

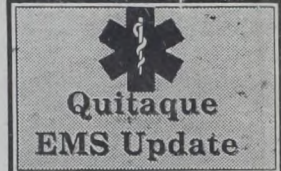
