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## Heavy Rains Fall In Area Monday Night Of This Week

Rains ranging from around .50 to more than five inches fell in the Quitaque and Turkey area Monday night of this week.

Heaviest reports came from west and south of Quitaque and from east of Turkey. At the Dale Smith farm southwest of Quitaque it was reported that around five inches fell and that the "creeks were up." At the Grady

Tyler farm, between four and five inches were recorded. In Quitaque around 2½ inches were recorded but from the eastern edge of Quitaque the rainfall was lighter.

Rabb Hamilton, Jimmy Ross and Mrs. Bill Helms reported receiving only about half an inch. Just about a mile west of Turkey the amounts started picking up a little, with about an inch falling in town and getting heavier on east of Turkey, and southeast where some four inch amounts were reported.

When big, hard rains fall, some damage always occurs in the form of terraces washing, crops being washed away, etc., but in the case of Monday night's rain the good outweighed the bad and prospects for good crops in our area look pretty good right now.

## Annual Greenbelt Bowl Game Set For Saturday Night

All but one of the players selected to play in the Annual Greenbelt Bowl Game at Childress showed up for the Sunday physicals and that one player was quickly replaced. Both the East and West squads were reported to be at full 22-player strength when two-day drills were scheduled to begin Monday morning. A parade will be held at 4 p.m. Friday and for the first time in history the Queen candidates will ride in a caravan of convertibles from Wichita Falls.

Final judging in the queen contest will be done at half-time of the football game.

The game is scheduled to start at 8:00 p.m. Friday.

It is hoped that a large crowd of fans from the Turkey-Quitaque area will drive down to Childress for the game Friday night.

Funeral services for Mrs. R. A. Seay, 85, were held at 3:00 p.m. Wednesday at the First Baptist Church in Matador. Officiating was Rev. Larry Heard of Idalou, a former pastor. Interment was in East Mound Cemetery, under the direction of Seigler Funeral Home.

Mrs. Seay died late Sunday, July 25, at her home in Matador. Her death was not discovered until Monday morning, by her sister, Mrs. Lena Fisher. Mrs. Seay had been slightly ill for several days, although her condition was not thought to be serious. Death was attributed to natural causes.

The former Lillie Pearl Garrison, Mrs. Seay was born October 23, 1890 in Jack County, Texas, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Garrison. She came to Motley County with her parents in 1900, lived in Terry County for about six years, and returned to Matador in 1909. She was married to Richard Alva Seay, June 20, 1922, in Floydada. They were in the abstract business here for many years, and Mrs. Seay took care of the business during the years her husband was County Clerk.

Mrs. Seay was a long-time member of the First Baptist Church, Matador, and for many years worked in the Sunday School departments. Mr. Seay preceded her in death February 1, 1970. Mrs. Seay continued to lead an active life until her own death at the age of 85 years, 9 months and 2 days.

She is survived by one brother, Gabe Garrison of Silverton, and her sister, Mrs. Lena Fisher of Matador. A large number of nieces and nephews also survive.

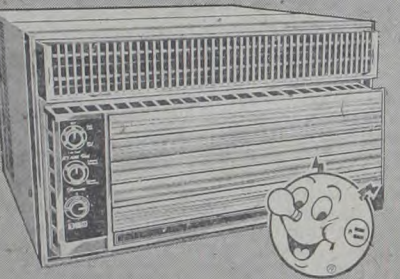

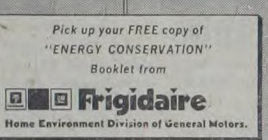
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**Miss Janna Turner Honored With Bridal Shower**
