Valley School Trustees Choose Jerry Bob Smith As Superintendent

in a called meeting Monday, January 21 at 8:00 p.m. Two items were on the agenda but it was decided to postpone discussions of the audit of the 1989-90 year until a later time. The Board went into executive session at 8:10 p.m. to consider applicants for the position of School Superintendent. This office had come open with the board's acceptance of Wilburn Leeper's resignation in December, to be effective June 30,

The trustees decided to select a new superintendent from within the school system and interviews were conducted earlier this month. Jerry Maupin, Principal, and Jerry Bob Smith, school counselor/assistant principal were the candidates considered.

The executive session concluded after one hour of delib-eration by the full board and Mr. Leeper. Board President, Brent Guest opened the resumed meeting with the comment that, 'It has been a diffi-cult hour. We have two real strong candidates. In fact the board has come to a unanimous decision after discussing this for many hours." At that point he entertained a motion which he received along with a second and the board did vote together with Ronald Lynn Mullin abstaining. It was decided to offer Jerry Bob Smith a two year ract as superintendent.

Mr. Smith comes to the position with twenty-three years experience in education,. last thirteen years have been spent in the Valley school system as a teacher, counselor and assistant principal. During those years he has earned the respect of colleagues, students, and the community.

Retiring Superintendent, Wilburn Leeper, told the Tribune following the meeting that the school board had struggled in their effort to make the best decision in selecting the best candidate for the position. The determination to hire from within the system was made after considering the advantages of having a person who knows the community, is familiar with the school system, has an established working relationship with the school board.

Leeper stated that he and Smith will begin work immediately on setting up the transistion which will become effective July 1, 1991. Leeper feels the Valley School is a sound system, educationally, academically, and financially. He will be available for consultation at the new superintendent's discretion. "Naturally," he said,

"that will be strictly up to the superintendent."

War Spreads in Mid-East

At 3:50 p.m. Wednesday January 17, 1991 Operation Desert Shield became Operation Desert Storm as F-15 E fighter bombers left Saudi Arabia to head north to strike Iraq's strangle hold on Kuwait.

The United States and its allies began to engage targets in Kuwait so that Kuwait may be liberated. The first strikes were aimed at Saddam Hussein's military sites, the same sites he had used to conquer Kuwait, and Baghdad, capital of Iraq.

On August 2, 1990, Saddam Hussein took Kuwait over by force in defiance to being condemned by the rest of the world. He chose to ignore economic pressure which was used to try to force him to withdraw from Kuwait.

Saddam Hussein also refused to make any compromises with the United Nations to prevent war breaking out.
Therefore on January 17,




