#### **DeHoyes Charged** With Murder

Freddie DeHoyes, 39, of Wichita Falls, Texas, was arraigned Monday, December 19, 1988, at Clarendon on a charge of first-degree murder in the shooting death of Ruben Rubio Torres of Memphis.

Donley County Justice of the Peace W.W. Lovelady set bond at \$50,000 for DeHoyes who remained in Donley County Jail early last week.

Torres, 36, died shortly after arrival at Northwest Texas Hosptial in Amarillo on Sunday. According to Donley County Sheriff Jimmy Thompson, he had been shot four times

The two men had attended a wedding reception at the Clarendon Community Cen-ter when DeHoyes created a disturbance and Torres asked him to leave. Shortly thereafter, the shooting thereafter, occurred at about 12:30 a.m.

Torres was born in Robstown, and had lived in Memphis for several years.

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The Medicare Castastrophic Coverage Act of 1988 eliminated

requirements that patients with long-term hospitalizations pay part of their daily Medicare eligible expenses from their own pockets or with supplemental

Starting January 1, 1989, Medicare will pay for as many as 365 days a year of Medicare-eligible hospitalization after the patient has paid a one-time deductible of

Before the new law, Medicare required patients to pay substantial daily "co-payments" when they were hospitalized longer than 60 days.

Since co-payments for hospital re will not be required after care will not be required after January 1, Medicare supplement insurance policies no longer may provide benefits to fill the gap.

Range Fire Danger
The current high fire danger and rash of range fires throughout most of West Texas is threatening lives and livestock, as well as homes and other property, and exhausting local firefighters, ac-cording to John Crowell, with the Soil Conservation Service.

"Because of the dangerous conditions, " Crowell said, "we are asking all residents and visitors of Briscoe County to be extremely

careful with any outside fires."

Crowell said that most fires are caused by human carelessness, but that two additional aspects are compounding problem. the current

First, the current drought conditions--called the worst since the 1950's--have turned pasture grasses into volatile fuels, and when we have day after day of low relative humidity, and gusty winds, fire danger remains very high. Also, approximately 46 thou-sand acres of Briscoe County land are not being grazed, under the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). In fire danger terms, this means that the ungrazed grasses are taller and therefore become more fuel for potential range fires.

We all need to remember the "Big County Fire" in March which burned 300,000 acres in Shackleford, Callahan, Haskell and Throckmorton counties, and other large fires in the Del Rio and Alpine areas.

In less than two days, the Big Country Fire, which started north of Baird, grew to have a 56-mile long fire-front. It destroyed more than \$5 million in pasture, live-stock, oil field equipment and fences, but miraculously only a few structures were lost, thanks primarily to superhuman efforts and cooperation of 47 fire de-

#### Guard May Fire Be Needed

If you have land in the Conservation Reserve Program and are interested in installing a fire guard, there are ways to do so

without violating your contract.

John Crowell, District Conervationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Silverton, said that he understands that the rules for installing them are fairly simple. The contract requirements are set by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation

'First, you need to protect the fire guard from excessive erosion", Crowell said. "The fire guard also needs to be next to a road and be written into the CRP plan."

'To prevent excessive erosion farmers may want to plant annual wildlife strips in lieu of bare ground. Or the producer may prefer to merely keep the guard mowed or shredded closely."
