The top offensive pass player, Kirk Saul, hit for five touch downs and rushed for another as Valley defeated Crowell. Sau completed 22 of 30 passes for 310 yards. This brings Valley to $6-0$ for the season, and 1-0 in district play.
Brandon Smith took the first pass from Saul 20 yards for a score and the kick failed, giving Valley a $6-0$ lead at the end of the first period.
In the second quarter, Saul passed for four yards to Matt Barrett, then hit Lane Myers for a 25 -yard scoring toss. Saul took the ball into the endzone on a one-yard sprint and Scott Sau
