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## Good Rains Fall Over Area

What had been called the longest drought since 1911 in this area might not have been broken last Saturday and Saturday night but a real good dent was put into it as good, general rains fell over this part of the world.

Sprinkles and mist Saturday afternoon finally turned into rain and by the time the life giving moisture had quit falling Sunday morning, everyone in this vicinity had received at least an inch, according to the reports turned in to The Tribune. Most reports received from around an inch and a half to more than three inches in spots.

In Quitaque most of those with rain gauges said they caught around 1 1/2 inches. In Turkey, a late afternoon cloud dumped more than two inches in a hard downpour which flooded the Main Street curb to curb, according to reports. The rain was generally heavier southeast and east of Quitaque and in the Turkey area.

Saturday's rain was the first moisture of any consequence to fall here in this area in nearly six months and needless to say it was sorely needed. This winter has been a complete turnabout from last year when snow fell just about every week and when spring-time came the ground was wet and ready to be worked when the time came. Now with spring just a week away at least there is some hope for harvests ahead.

The 6-foot Miss Brunson, a four-time letter winner, averaged 12 rebounds and four steals per game for Valley during the past season.

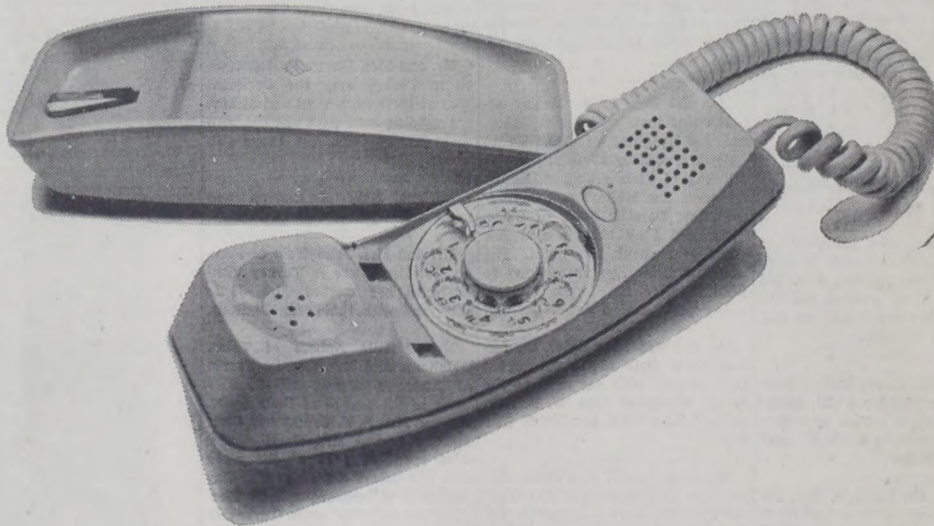

## Baling Wire Shortage Hit By State Senator

Senator Jack Hightower (D-Ver-non) said Tuesday "it is appalling that while the U. S. is facing a baling wire shortage for 1974, we cannot get countries like Japan that has bought most of our cotton crop to send us wire in return."

Hightower, Democratic candidate for 13th District Congressman, also warned farmers and ranchers to place wire orders early so that distributors can gauge area needs in advance.

"While the foreign industrial boom has kept a lid on wire imports, the low priority nature of baling wire and domestic price controls have made the prospect for increased wire production pre-

## Horsemanship Clinic Planned In Lubbock

Horsemen of all ages and experience will get a rare opportunity to develop their skills in a horsemanship clinic in Lubbock March 29-30.

A three-man team of horse specialists, noted for their teaching skills and horsemanship abilities, will demonstrate everything from grooming and discipline to performance maneuvers and basic horse-manship, says County Extension Agent Jimmy Vanstorty.

The men are B. F. Yeates, Gary Potter and Doug Householder, all Extension specialists with The Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station.

The event gets underway in the Fair Park Coliseum at the Pan-handle South Plains Fairgrounds at 4:30 p.m., Friday, March 29, and will continue through the evening until about 9:30. Convening again on Saturday at 9 a.m., the clinic will last most of the day, adjourning at 4:30.

Registration for adults (18 and over) is \$7.50. For youths from ages 9 to 17, the fee is \$4.50, and for children under eight years, \$2.75. These registration fees include a barbecue luncheon.

The event, Vanstorty emphasizes, is open to people of all ages. People living in or outside a residential area who have horses will be especially interested in improving their horsemanship abilities, he adds.

Specific skills to be taught include grooming and discipline, basic western horsemanship such as control of feet, hands and legs and proper posture, performance maneuvers such as driving, stopping, turnout and leading, and skills in barrels, poles, reining and hunt seat.

The South Plains Development Program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is sponsoring the clinic. The Lubbock Chamber of Commerce is co-sponsor.

## 74 Crop Cotton Loan Program Announced

Washington, Feb. 20—The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) today announced premiums and discounts for grade and staple length and differentials for micronaire readings for upland cotton. These quality differentials will be used by the Commodity Credit Corporation in making loans on eligible qualities of upland cotton under the 1974 loan program. USDA also announced loan rates for eligible qualities of extra long staple cotton.

As announced August 27, 1973, the preliminary base loan rate for middling 1-inch upland cotton (micronaire 3.5 through 4.9), net weight, at average location, is 25.26 cents per pound. The base quality for computing upland cotton loan rates for various qualities, however, will be strict low middling 1 1/16 inches. This change was made last year for use in market quotations as well as for loan purposes.

The 1974 program difference between middling 1-inch and strict low middling 1 1/16 inches will be 180 points (1.80 cents) per pound. Thus the base loan rate for 1974 crop strict low middling 1 1/16 inches will be 27.06 cents per pound, and the accompanying schedule of premiums and discounts for upland cotton is based on this rate.

Department officials pointed out that the schedules of premiums and discounts for grade and staple length and micronaire differences announced today do not reflect the full degree of differences in the current market; however, these loan differences compared to the 1973 loan schedules point in the direction of price movements during the present marketing year.

"This situation could have been eased by adjusting Phase IV price controls to make baling wire a more profitable item for steel companies to produce. The shortage should have been remedied when a wire shortage occurred last year. The fact that Phase IV price controls have made domestic wire production unprofitable points to their inherent weaknesses. This is another example of a shortage caused by ineffective attempts to control prices. The fertilizer shortage and last year's beef shortage are cases in point."
