Quitaque Quest Race For All ages At State Park During Foliage Fest

by Wilburn Leeper The October 21st Quitaque Quest bike race is an important event in our Fall Foliage celebration. It brings to light that Quitaque is central to the best biking terrain in the Texas Panhandle and beyond. Racing events, like Quitaque Quest, promote Quitaque as a fun spot to tourist who enjoy out-of-doors activities. Mountain biking at Caprock Canyons State Park is becoming well known. Biking, like camping, horseback riding and hiking, is making good use

of our Park trails. Seventy-five to 100 bike riders will compete in the up-coming Quitaque Quest. Riders may enter beginner, sport or expert categories for men or women and will fall into four age classes. All women events and the beginner category will compete by riding 14 miles. Sport and expert categories will ride two loops or 28

The course will start on the rugged Eagles Point Trail for the first two mile leg and then will move onto the Lower Canyon Trail for the next 9 miles. The Lower Canyon Trail is considered very technical for bikers because of the number of creek bottoms which are necessary to cross and narrow trails. The riders will exit the Park onto the county road near the bottom of the river hill and must climb two miles uphill before the riding becomes easier. The riders will re-enter the Park at the main gate and return to the finish line after crossing the dam.

What kind of participants will enter the race? Although calls have been received from all ages and variety of experiences, the most common calls have come from beginners. Most beginners have never participated in a race before but have a love for biking and want to try their skill at racing. Most bikers who enjoy biking do not have access to biking terrain found at Caprock Canyons. Participants will come from Dallas, points in Oklahoma, New Mexico, Tyler area, Austin and San Antonio. Most participants however, will come from immediate cities such as Amarillo, Lubbock, Lockney and

Registration will take place at the group shelter at Caprock Canyons State Park beginning at 8 a.m. on the 21st and will continue until 9:30. A prerace meeting will occur at 9:30 for participants and the race will start at 10 a.m. Intervals of two minutes will separate the start of racers by categories and age. Expert riders will start first, followed by the sport and then



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
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

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Upcoming Election For Conservation

Zone 3 Director

An election of a soil and water conservation district director to serve in Zone 3 on the Hall-Childress Soil and Water Conservation Dis-trict is scheduled for October 10 at the Bob Wills center in Turkey, Texas announced A. J. Johnson, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 9 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years of age or

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district must own land in the subdivision he or she represents, be 18 years of age or older and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. The candidate must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and water conservation district directors serve four year terms of of-

Zone 3 of the district includes an area from a line beginning at that part of Hall County south of Prairie Dog Town Fork of Red River and west of a line beginning at a point on the Prairie Dog Town Fork Red River, and running due south through Parnell, to the Motley-Hall County line.

Current members of the board of

directors of the Hall-Childress SWCD are James Fuston, Turkey; Pete Jones, Tell; Dick Hutcherson, Memphis; Don Ray Crooks, Childress; and A. J. Johnson, Childress.

The purpose of the Hall-Childress SWCD, with headquarters in Childress and Memphis is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agricultural lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers, ranchers, and local community entities on conservation matters.

The district board of directors coordinate the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations. The district has the authority to enterinto working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCD's programs.
