On April 4, more than 20,000 Adopt-a-Highway volunteers will spend their Saturday picking up roadside litter during the seventh annual "Great Texas Trash-Off," the nation's largest cleanup effort, sponsored by the Texas Department of Transportation

In Hall County, one group will join in the effort to help get the bottles out of the wildflowers. Organizations such as Turkey Lions Club have participated in the Trash-Off every year since 1987.

"When you drive around on the date of the Great Texas Trash-Off and see thousands of volunteers clean up after the litterers, you can't help but get behind the program. Texans have tremendous pride in their state and they want to keep it beautiful," said Earlene Delaney, Childress District Adopta-Highway Coordinator.
