




Storm Rakes Quitaque Monday Night



HARDEST HIT IN MONDAY night's storm at Quitaque was the compress where two large warehouses were almost completely destroyed. Curiously, the parts of the building that were left standing were on the south end of each building. Mgr. R. J. Harmon stated that for all practical purposes both of the warehouses were "totaled."

High winds, twisting winds, or a tornado—these are all terms that have been used to describe the violent weather that hit Quitaque around 9 o'clock Monday night, but most people believe it was probably a funnel cloud that passed over Quitaque, perhaps not actually touching down but was close enough to touching down that it caused a yet unestimated amount of damage. Hard rain and hail accompanied the storm.

Hardest hit by the storm was the Quitaque Compress where

their two largest buildings were almost totally unroofed. The north building lost almost the entire roof lifted off and part of the debris was scattered over a wide area. The building just south of that one lost probably three-fourths of the roof and walls. Manager R. J. Harmon stated that both of them could be counted as "totaled." Several smaller buildings were badly damaged also.

The storm was travelling from northwest to southeast and the Quitaque Elevator and Farmers

Co-op Gin, just a few yards away from the compress, did not appear to have suffered damage.

Next in the path of the storm was the storage house at the back of Johnson & Son Lumber Co. The north end of that building lost the roof and the roof of Farley's Flowers & Variety had considerable damage as it was almost lifted and blown away. A storage house belonging to Weldon Purcell was sitting on a trailer on the vacant lot across the street from Wilma's Grocery and was blown off the trailer. A large trailer home which had been moved into Quitaque only about a month ago and was sitting on concrete blocks, was blown off the blocks at the east end. The John Kings had a small metal storage house in their back yard and this was lifted up and crumpled in a heap about 50 yards away.

Damage was reported at the property owned by Jimmy Davidson (the place owned by the late Mr. and Mrs. Otis Wilson northwest of Quitaque) and at the Edmonds Feed Lot east of town. There was a tremendous amount of damage to trees all over town.

Considerable hail damage was recorded also, to crops and roof tops and gardens. The hail in Monday night's storm did not cover a real big area. Damage reportedly started at about the Leroy Hamilton property north of Quitaque and was confined to an area a couple of miles west of town and roughly a couple of miles south. A hard rain with reports of from 1.10 to three inches of rain accompanied the storm.

On Tuesday in the late afternoon another hail storm hit the area south of Quitaque. This storm generally followed along the path of the late summer hailstorm that destroyed many acres of good crops last year. Hard rains also accompanied this storm. About a quarter of an inch of rain fell in town.

Turkey did not receive any of the severe damage in Monday night's storm. A rainfall report of .7 of rain with no hail was given. On Tuesday night, however, the hailstorm that started south of Quitaque moved into the area south of Turkey causing considerable damage, according to reports given to The Tribune.



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Young Plainview Singer Records Two Barnhill Songs

West Texas has long been a breeding ground for country and western musicians who made it to the bigtime. Bob Wills did it; Jimmy Dean did it; and now Plainviewian Lloyd Watts is making his bid for stardom.

Watts, a 28-year-old lifetime resident of Plainview, has just produced and released his first album after several months of work and travel between Plainview and Nashville. The final nationwide mailing was made June 12 to some 2,400 radio stations across the United States.

The album, entitled "Leaving Caroline," was cut in Nashville last February after Watts' initial visit to Country Music Capital in January. Watts flew to Tennessee "to find out what it would take to make an album out there, because no one around here could do it like it should be done." Watts had previously cut a record in Lubbock last year, but was not satisfied just to stop at that. In Nashville he sat in on recording sessions and talked with officials at Nashville recording companies. He was given some 400 pieces of music from which to choose 10 songs for his album, including the title song, "Leaving Caroline." The enterprise rapidly became somewhat of a one-man show, and Watts had to hire all the musicians for the album himself.

As it turned out, six of the 10 songs Lloyd selected were published by subsidiaries of Capital Records, one of the largest recording firms in the nation. Two of those six, in turn, were written by Joe Bob Barnhill, Capital representative for Nashville. Although Watts has yet to meet Barnhill, Joe Bob heard his album and was "really impressed with it." Barnhill was so pleased with Watts' efforts that he paid \$3,000 to hire a promotion man for Lloyd. The PR man happens also to be handling Ray Price's contracts.

According to Watts, Barnhill is supposed to take the album to Capital's Los Angeles headquarters soon, probably within the next week. If the album receives any response in California, Lloyd said, he hopes to get it charted with the nation's record-rating services. Barnhill also mentioned the possibility of Capital releasing the album and single in Canada on one of its own labels.

The album, cut in the "progressive country" mood made famous by Willie Nelson and Waylon Jennings, is presently being promoted by Adonda Records of Nashville, although Watts says he has no contract with the company. He added that Producer Don Fowler and Arranger Harrison Tyner have done all the leg work for the album so far.

Watts is featured on the album cover with his wife, Darla. While in Nashville he was asked about the possibilities of hiring a model to pose for the cover. Watts suggested that he use his wife, but officials insisted that they see a picture of her before they agreed. Once they got the picture, Watts said, they agreed that she would do.

Lloyd and his wife have been married 7½ years and have two children, Keeley, 6, and Sheila, 3. A 1966 graduate of PHS where he was president of the Senior Class, Watts attended Texas Tech for

two years before venturing off into the business world. He worked with Southwestern Investment Co. for 2½ years and was promoted to loan manager before he resigned. He entered the insurance business with Mutual of Omaha five years ago and has been there since then. Watts' father, Lloyd, sr., has been with the same firm for 25 years.

Financing for the recording venture came from a rather tragic incident in Lloyd's life. On May 31 of last year, Lloyd was helping his father build a basement using a trencher. In a freak accident the trencher came down on his foot and severed his right leg about four inches below the knee. Lloyd noted that quick thinking on the part of persons operating the machinery prevented the accident from being worse. The insurance money he collected from the incident has helped pay for the album.

Watts said, "I'm encouraged by Freddie Hart and the album which contained his hit, "Easy Loving." It seems Hart's company released him from the contract because it was a flop. Porter Waggoner picked up Hart as a back-up for his show as a result. According to Watts, a disc jockey at radio station WWL in New Orleans played Hart's record over the air and received a tremendous response from listeners.

The station's program director decided to air it regularly, and the rest is history. Watts added that the recording company had to pay Waggoner a large sum to get Hart back.

Lloyd laughed, "At least for three years, I'll have hopes for the album, but I can't do anything without the help of people, even the people I don't know." Watts said that the best way someone could help would be to call the radio stations and request to hear it. The number of requests and the times the record is played will be used to determine where the record will chart. According to Don Fowler, with a new artist it is sometimes hard to get a station's program director to give the records air time.

Plainview and area residents could go a long way in making sure the album receives the proper attention by requesting it at local stations. The album is also available to the public, and is sold exclusively in Plainview by OK Radio and TV.

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
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


The Bicentennial Committee will not be responsible for loss or damage to quilts on display, but there will be someone to stay with the display at all times.
