12 Out Of Our 23 Make It To Houston

The past weekend was a tense two days for twenty-three Valley FFA and 4-H members as the swine sift was underway at Brenham, Texas. Students left behind waited nervously for the call from Mr. D about how their pig had fared. When the dust had cleared, the judges had picked a total of twelve hogs, out of the twenty-three entries, from Valley to compete in one of the largest livestock show and sales in the country.

Nine FFA students, instructor Jon Davidson, and Mr. and Mrs. Clinton Pigg left last Thursday evening for Brenham. They worked through the two-day event washing, brushing, and preparing all the swine for the sift. A total of 3800 different

breeds of swine were checked in and judged, that many students across the state were

waiting to hear the magic words "going to Houston." A total of 1248 head of hogs made it through the sift, leaving 2552 very disappointed owners.

Saturday's judging netted Valley seven to show, with the remaining five picked during Sunday's show. The other eleven were trucked at market price.

This was a very impressive way to close out National FFA Week for the Valley Chapter.

Sitting at the editor's desk has certainly been an education for me. I don't know if I would term the following "education" or not, but the following tid-bits were things I would never have known if the information had not accumulated at this desk.

Graveside services for James Birt Castleberry, 91, were held Sunday, February 26, 1989, at 3 p.m. at Resthaven Cemetery of Quitaque with the Rev. Melvin Clinton, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Turkey, officiating. Arrangements were under the direction of Schooler-Gordon Funeral Directors of Turkey.

Castleberry died late Friday, February 24, 1989, in the Memphis Convalescent Center after a lengthy illness.

He was born on July 27, 1897 in Rockwall County, Texas. He married Snow Chandler on July 21, 1918 in Arkansas. She preceded him in death on December 11, 1983. He moved to the Texas Panhandle in 1920 and lived in various locations in the Panhandle owning and operating grocery stores. He was a longtime grocer in Turkey, a veteran of World War I, and a Baptist.

Survivors include a son, Howard Castleberry of Forestville, California; a daughter, Bertie Garner of Turkey; a brother, John Castleberry of Amarillo; five grandchildren, eleven great-grandchildren and four great-great-grandchildren.

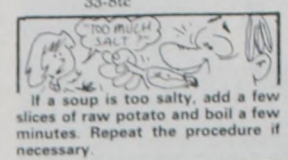
