tween runaways and thei families. Smith identified the following message left by a 14 year old runaway named "Amy as a typical first message: "I'm safe. I want to know if you want me to come home so we can work things out I love you." According Smith, "Amy's" mother wa daughter was safe. Both mother and child were reunited the fol lowing day.
We hope our new toll-free telephone number will enable us to assist many more Texas
