Property Owners Urged To Check Tax Notices

view the notices carefully. If there are questions or problems with the values, the Appraisal Review Board (ARB) requests that the taxpayer contact the appraisal district staff for an explanation.

If the values cannot be agreed upon, the property owner will have an opportunity in early July to protest proposed appraisals of their property for local taxes. The deadline for filing a written notice of protest is Wednesday, June 20, 1990. The ARB will begin hearing taxpayers protests

The State Property Tax Board has issued a pamphlet called "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, how to prepare and present an appeal to the ARB. The pamplet is available at the Briscoe coe County Appraisal District office. For a copy, contact the appraisal district staff at the County courthouse in Silverton.

Since this is the year for mass appraisals (an event which occurs every 4 years) all property owners in the Briscoe County Appraisal District should be receiving an appraisal notice on every piece of property they own, according to chief appraisal for



 Stir again and strain into a pitcher holding another quart of cold water. Serve over ice. Makes 2 quarts.

1/3 cup finely chopped green pepper 1/2 cup stuffed green olives,

1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/3 cup dairy sour cream
2 tablespoons chili sauce
1 teaspoon drained horseradish
1/4 teaspoon Tabasco sauce
3/4 cup diced celery onion 3 cups diced cooked chicken Core tomatoes and remove seeds with a spoon. Cut into eighths almost t

Core tomatoes and remove seeds with a spoon. Cut into eighths almost to the bottom. Sprinkle the insides with salt and pepper. Invert on paper toweling and let drain.

Meanwhile, combine mayonnaise, sour cream, chili sauce, horseradish and Tabasco in large bowl. Mix well. Stir in remaining ingredients. Cover and refrigerate until ready to stuff tomatoes.

To serve, gently pull tomatoes apart. Spoon in chicken mixture, dividing evenly. Arrange on a serving platter garnished with salad greens or parsley if desired.

East Texas, which has 10,000 acres of bearing peach trees, expects to harvest "an excellent crop," according to Marty Baker of the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Overton. County agents in Parker, Limestone and Freestone counties predict harvets ranging from 60 to 80 percent of a full crop.

PEACH DUMPLINGS

- 3 C. sliced fresh or frozen peaches
- pancake mix
- 2 T. butter or margarine 1/4 C. firmly-packed brown sugar
- 1/4 tsp. nutmeg

Combine peaches, water, sugar and lemon juice in a 3-quart saucepan. Bring to a boil. In separate bowl, combine pancake mix, butter, brown

sugar and nutmeg. Add milk, stirring lightly. Drop batter by tablespoon into boiling peach mixture. Reduce heat, cover and cook 15 minutes without lifting cover. Serve warm with ice cream or whipped cream. Makes 4-6 servings.
