### Three-Wire Plugs: What They Mean to You

Over eight decades have passed since Thomas Edison introduced the phenomenon of his electric light to an annazed world. In many ways electricity remains a mystery to man, yet it is an essential part of our contemporary society. However, at the flick of a switch electricity can be come a killer. Ferhaps the figure of approximately 1000 lives per year being taken by electric shock is not so staggering, considering that over 200 million people live in this country. Nevertheless, it is still a wanton and needless waste of human life.

Many means are being employed to reduce shock fatalities and one such method is the 3-wire plug. The third wire of this plug acts as what is called a ground conductor and serves as one of the protective means for the device. Such protection is accomplished through the ability of the wire to force the fuse or circuit

breaker to "blow", thereby eliminating any shock hazard. Though originally found pri-marily on power tools, 3-wire plugs are now used on many appliances.

When a situation arises regarding "blowing" fuses or circuit breakers, it should be emphasized that this happens for your protection. There is nothing wrong with the fuse. The fault lies elsewhere; either with the appliance which forces this reaction or because the circuit has been overloaded. In either case, the fuse is just doing its job of protecting you and warning that something is wrong. Should an instance occur wherein there is a fault in an appliance but a fuse doesn't "blow", the appliance becomes an extreme hazard as it remains "live". Therefore, if one were to contact the "live" metal enclosure of that appliance and some

thing which is grounded (radiator, refrigerator, water pipe, etc.), shock and possible electrocution could result.

Perhaps your home is not equipped with grounding type receptacles. If this is the case, an adapter is available to accommodate the 3 wire plug. But always make sure the green grounding lead of the adapter is connected to the faceplate of the receptacle.

Another point to be remembered is never to remove the ground plu from a 3-wire plug. This would allow the plug to be used in a 2-hole receptacle, but the protective capability is rendered useless.

COTTON TOPPING CAN BE

INVALUABLE CULTURAL TOOL

Cotton topping can be an inval-uable cultural tool in High Plains farmers' box of practices, especial-ly in this type of year where late summer rains forced cotton plants to put on extra vegetative growth, Jim Valliant, director of research, told farmers attending Field Day at the High Plains Research Foun

Valliant pointed out that in tests conducted by the Research Foundation, topping of cotton over a five-year period produced higher yields and returns with Paymaster 111 and Lockett 4789 than

In the tests the top 12 to 15 inches of the plant was removed by a rotary cutter.

Valliant said a five-year aver age showed topping increased the yield of Paymaster 111 from 678 to 689 pounds of lint per acre and Lockett 4789 from 631 to 640 pounds of lint per acre.

Returns were increased \$5.13 and \$4.83 per acre with the two varieties when the immature cotton in the top portion of the plant was removed, Valliant noted.

Cotton topping allows removal of the cotton plant that furnishes mos of the immature cotton and trash that reduces the quality of most High Plains cotton.

This vegetative growth uses unnecessary amounts of plant moisture and other nutrients that could be used on cotton produced in the lower part of the plant, Valliant said. "We know that 90% of cotton produced each season comes from bolls set during the first four weeks of blooming." he said. "By removing the top portion of the plant, we are insuring that the cotton set in the lower part of the plant has more of a chance to mature," said Valliant.


