#### **Briscoe & Hall Counties To** Pay \$30,000 Each In Tulia **Drug Bust Settlement**

Drug Bust Settlement

Details were announced recently by representatives of the Texas Association of Counties in regard to their 17-county \$560,000 settlement. A representative from the Sims, Hubbert and Wilson Law firm in Lubbock explained recently, to the Childress County Commissioners, that 45 people were allegedly mistreated by Tom Coleman, undercover agent for Panhandle Regional Narcotics Trafficking Task Force, of which Briscoe & Hall were members.

According to the Childress Index settlement amounts for the cities and counties involved were:

\* City of Amarillo - \$5,000,000

\* Cities of Borger, Canyon and Pampa; Counties of Collingsworth, Childress, Ochiltree, and Potter - \$50,000 each.

\* Randell County - \$25,000.

\* Commissioners unamiously approved Private Work Contracts #04-004 for Clifton Stodghill and #04-005 for Marvin Carlisle, both located in Precinct #4.

The meeting was then adjourned.

\* Council was informed of Darrell Tyler's request for water from the line designated for school use. This request will be researched by the City Manager.

\* EMS reported 4 runs since the last meeting. It was also noted that all the new radios have been distributed and are being used by fire and EMS departments.

\* Fire Deptment reported a few unreported controlled burns. The Forestry Service has been contacted about obtaining a 5ton truck to replace the tanker truck.

\* It was reported that the auditor had lost all the files, but was replacing them, so no audit was avaliable for review.

\*Atmos Energy presented an Ordinance to the City, pertaining to the City's gas rates. The Council adopted the ordinance as presented.

Roof bids for the community center from Locklear Roofing and Parsley's Sheet Metal and Roofing Co., Inc were reviewed. The Council agreed to table the motion to roof the community center and fire hall for now, until more funding is available. Arlene Hinkle was appointed as city election judge

\* The Council voted to support use of the new community center for Tri-County Meals' base of operations.

\* The Council was informed of street repairs which are still ongoing, and expressed their appreciation to Commissioner Grimland and to L.B. Monk for all their help with the street

#### Valley FFA Judging Team Wins State Contest

Members of the Valley FFA Dairy Products Judging Team placed 1st at the State FFA Judging Contest last Thursday, April 22nd at Tarleton State University in Stephenville. Members of the team including Katherine Pigg, Chase Maynard, Maddie Ramsey, Macy Davidson, Molly Davidson, and Alicia Roys posted a team score of 580 defeating the second place team from Lavernia who posted a team score of 570. 49 teams and 187 individuals from the 10 Area FFA Associations participated in the State Judging Contest. Valley's Katherine Pigg was 1st High Individual of the State Contest posting a perfect 200 score. Chase Maynard and Maddie Ramsey were 4th and 5th High Individuals of the contest, each with an individual score of 190. "The perfect 200 individual score of Katherine's is extremely rare and has not happened in any State Contest in recent years" said Robert Herrington Valley Ag. Science Instructor and Coach of the team

This team qualified for the State Judging contest by winning the Greenbelt District and Area I contest held at Texas Tech University on April 17th. Valley was second overall at Texas Tech behind Klondike from Area II. This Valley team has been very successful this year winning 1st at the Tarleton Contest and State Contest, 2nd at Clarendon, Texas Tech and Snyder and 4th at the WTAMU contest. The Valley Team will participate at the National FFA Judging Contest in October at the National FFA Convention in Louisville, Kentucky.

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

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

# Cooks

It's always good to have a prepared-even dessert- in 30 minutes or less, but when days are especially busy, it's a necessity. For the next few weeks, I'll have some tasty but fast menus for you to try.
If you don't cook the whole menu, try a dish or two with what you already planned to cook. Enjoy!

Oven-Fried Catfish cup crushed cornflakes 4 teaspoon celery salt 1/4 teaspoon onion powder 1/4 teaspoon paprika 1/4 teaspoon pepper 6 catfish fillets (6 oz. each)

1/3 cup butter or margarine, melted In a shallow bowl, combine

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn said the state received \$1.18 billion in sales tax revenue in March, a 17.2 percent increase compared with March 2003.

"This tremendous jump is a direct result of my recommendation to the legislature to have a tax amnesty plan to bring dollars into our state coffers," Strayhorn said.

Early returns from "Project: Pay Up," a tax amnesty period from March 11-31, helped boost sales tax revenue. The final results of "Project: Pay Up," are still being tallied. During the amnesty period authorized by the 78th Legislature, businesses owing delinquent taxes had an opportunity to pay their tax debt without facing penalties and interest normally assessed against delinquent taxpayers.

Strayhorn sent \$295.1 million in April sales tax allocations to cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts, an 11.4 percent increase compared to April 2003. So far this calendar year, sales tax allocations to local governments are up 8.2 percent as the Texas economy continues to gain momentum.

Comptroller Strayhorn sent April sales tax allocations of \$199.1 million to Texas cities, up 11.2 percent compared with April 2003. Calendar year-to-date, city sales tax allocations are running 8.7 percent higher than last year. Texas counties received sales tax payments of \$16.7 million, up 7.3 percent compared with one year ago. Calendar year-to-date, county sales tax allocations are 6.7 percent higher than last year

culture today announced that it will offer soybean producers the opportunity to request a referendum on the Soybean Promotion and Research Order as authorized under the soybean Promotion, Research, and Consumer Information Act.

The request for referendum will be conducted at USDA's County Farm Service Agency offices. To be eligible to participate, producers must certify and provide documentation that shows that they produced soybeans and

son or by sending a request by mail or facsimile. Forms may also be obtained from: http:// www.ams.usda.gov/lsg/mph/rp-soy.htm. Individual producers and other producer entities may request a referendum at the County FSA office where their administrative farm records are maintained. For the producer not participating in FSA programs, the opportunity to request a referen-dum will be provided at the County FSA office where the producer owns or rents land. Mail in requests must be postmarked by May 28, 2004, and received in the county FSA office by June 7, 2004. All other requests made by facsimile or in person, must be received in the county FSA office by May 28, 2004.

USDA will conduct a referen-dum on the order if at lest 10 percent of the 663,880 soybean pro-ducers request a referendum, provided that no more than one-fifth be producers from one State.

The request for referendum is mandated by the act. The act re-quires that the Secretary of Agriculture conduct a request for ref-erendum every five years after the initial referendum, which was conducted in 1994.

USDA monitors activities of the United Soybean Board. The mandatory program is financed by an assessment of one-half of 1 percent of the net market value of the soybeans.

2004 Loan Table Will Reflect Markets Preference For Longer, Whiter Upland Cotton
Following USDA's April 12 release of the 2004 Upland Cotton Loan
Premium and Discount tables, High Plains' cotton growers will find
several things to be happy about as they prepare for the 2004 growing

several things to be happy about as they prepare for the 2004 growing season.

Overall the new tables present a mixed bag for producers, but the majority of the improvements lie in the portion many producers have set their sights on through the rapid adoption of varieties that produce longer and stronger fiber.

The good news is that across the board loan rates for White Grades (11-71) with Staple lengths of 32 or better will start off higher in 2004. In just about every case, producers landing cotton in these categories gain ground through either higher premiums or lower discounts.

Developing the final 2004 schedule of premiums and discounts, and maintaining the appropriate relative relationships between qualities within the structure of the loan table, was a little bit of a challenge according the USDA officials.

Most of that challenge was the result of the 2003 marketing year creating some unusual results when the previous loan table and the Spot market averages for the first seven m months of the 2003 marketing year were averaged to begin the process.

As is often the case, the initial formula derived table didn't suggest uniform changes and required some final adjustments to keep things in line.

Premiums and discount tables for other High Volume Instrument

(HVI) measured cotton quality components also proved to be a mixed bag in the end. Changes range from no adjustments to the premium and discount table for Length Uniformity to multiple changes in the

bag in the end. Change and discount table for Length Uniformity to multiple changes in the table for Micronaire.

In the 2004 Micronaire table producers will see cotton with Staple lengths of 32 and shorter get higher discounts for low mike readings from 2.7 - 3.4 as well as a slightly lower premium for mike readings from 3.7 - 4.2 in 2004.

Cotton with Staple lengths of 33 and longer will see a slightly larger micronaire premium for bales with readings of 3.7 - 4.2 while mike readings of 2.7 - 3.4 will change anywhere from +5 to -15 points from the 2003 table.

Strength discounts, trended upward with slightly lowered discounts.

for readings 25.4 g/tex and lowered. Strength readings from 25.4 g/tex through 29.4 will have no premium in 2004, while readings above 29 will receive slightly lower premiums compared to 2003, ranging 29 win receive signify lower premining compared to 2003, ranging from 30 to 60 points.

Another area that will see changes in 2004 is the discount schedule for Level One and Level Two bark. The discount for Level One bark in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma was increased from 145 points in

Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma was increased from 145 points in 2003 to 170 points in 2004.

The Commodity Credit Corporation Premium and discount tables provide the applicable premium and discount figures used to determine marketing loan values for cotton produced in the United States and supplied as collateral to the CCC.

Base loan rates for specific U.S. warehouse locations, also established by the CCC. remain unchanged in 2004. For cotton warehoused at Lubbock, a 2004 loan value will be calculated from a 51.6 cent per pound base, 40 points lower than the 52 cents per pound national base loan rate for cotton.

Elmer Ray served in the Navy during World War II. He received ribbons during his service in the Pacific and participated in the invasion of Okinawa.
