DOUBLE-CROPPING RANGELAND IS JUST PRACTICE, SAYS SCS BIOLOGIST

Why not double-crop rangeland, asks Allen Van Arman, biologist with the Conservation Service. Wildlife is usually found on lands used primarily for

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DOUBLE-CROPPING RANGELAND IS JUST GOOD PRACTICE, SAYS SCS BIOLOGIST

Why not double-crop your rangeland, asks Allen Vaughn, Annette Biologist with the Soil Conservation Service. Wildlife is usually present on lands used primarily for livestock.

Habitat for deer, quail and other wildlife has deteriorated on most of our grazing lands due to invasion of brush and overgrazing, he said.

The wildlife crop can usually be increased at no extra expense if proper consideration is given during the planning of brush control and grassland management. This

second trip is often worth a considerable amount of money. It is always valuable even when no direct income is realized.

Controlling brush can be beneficial or harmful to wildlife, depending on how it is done, Vaughn said. Brush control has a tremendous effect on the ecology of the controlled area. It should be carefully planned to minimize damage to wildlife habitat and the total environment.

Mechanical means of brush control offers the greatest flexibility. Tree-doung allows selectivity in individual plants while creating ground disturbance. This soil disturbance often encourages the growth of annual herbs which provide some of the best food for quail and other wildlife.

Leaving desirable kinds of woody plants will help wildlife, provide shade and shelter for livestock, improve natural beauty and

increase the value of the land. Some good species to leave are hackberry, wild plum, elm, skunkbrush, lotebrush, cottonwood and others that provide shade or food and cover.

Controlling brush in patterns is a good practice. Leaving all brush on steeper land, along draws and creeks and otherwise tailoring to fit the land is most desirable. Controlling undesirable species in strips or blocks, and leaving controlled brush in piles for wildlife cover are also good techniques.

Leaving motts of scattered woody plants over the pasture is also good.

There are many other practices that effect wildlife habitat, but brush control is one of the most important, he biologist said. The landuser that desires to keep or increase wildlife needs to make specific plans to maintain or improve the habitat when controlling brush.

The biologist advises landowners to contact technicians of the Soil Conservation Service for help in planning for better wildlife habitats.

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RETIRED LUBBOCK POLICE CAPTAIN BURIED RECENTLY

Funeral services for Captain Henry Smith, 68, of 311 81st St., Lubbock, were conducted Friday, August 25. He had served on the Lubbock Police Department for more than 25 years before retirement on December 31, 1968. He died about 8:00 p.m. Wednesday, August 23, at Ray's Hospitality Home in Lubbock after a lengthy illness.

He was the brother of Mrs. E. E. Woods of Quitaque. Capt. Smith was born in Stephenville and had been a resident of Lubbock since 1940, moving there from Jayton. He was a member of the Church of Christ and served in the U. S. Army in 1942.

Upon retirement, Capt. Smith praised the Lubbock police and talked of changes during his years on the force.

He recalled officers rarely engaged in fast chases because police units could not take the speed.

"Most of the old cars had two to four hundred thousand miles on them, so they wouldn't go too fast, and since we only were working three cars at a time, it made it hard to set up roadblocks," Smith told a reporter.

With only three cars in action at any one time, the chances of sighting another patrol car while on duty were slim, he explained. "There were about three different occasions when policemen
