The Bible contains many, many stories of God believing in people and helping them to believe in themselves. Many wonderful things have been recorded in the Bible of people who made the wonderful choice to believe in themselves because God believed in them. Many people of the Bible, such as Moses felt they were not capable of the job God wanted done but he showed them he believed in them and the job was accomplished. Mary, Mother of our Savior had the faith to say, yes to God with no excuses. Try listening--Power to use your talents to their fullest will then be yours.


Genie Seymour Receives Tech Scholarship

WTU Proposals Boost Economy

The WestTexas economy could get boost if the Public Utilities Commission of Texas approves recom-mendations made recently by West Texas Utilities Company. "WTU has filed a request to offer

new services designed to attract and encourage business expansion in this area," according to Keith Edwards, WTU's area manager for Quitaque and Turkey. The three new experi-mental tariffs will allow WTU to provide economic development ser vice, curtailable service or interruptible service.

The services will be available to customers that voluntarily request and qualify for one of the service options

The new tariff proposals, which the company has asked the PUC to approve by March 1, 1992, would enefit all WTU customers because they would encourage new and existing businesses. In addition, the curtailable and interruptible rates can help delay the need to build new power plants in the future. WTU serves a 52,000 square mile area of Texas that stretches from the Red River to the Rio Grande.

*Keep light strings and other elec-cal decorations out of children's trical de

*Look for the UL Mark on light strings. Artificial trees should also carry the UL Mark—that means samples have been tested for flam-

 Check each light set for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, and loose connections.
Overloading circuits with too many decorative lights and/or light trives can cause free. strings can cause fires.

Check markings on light strings. Never use decorative lights outdoors

marked "For Indoor Use." "Always turn off tree lights before leaving home or going to bed. A short circuit can cause a fire.

*To prevent overhe age, use only decorative lamp fea-tures packaged with each string. Use only manufacturer's specified fuses and lamps when old ones burn out Make sure your tree is fresh who

you buy it. If the needles are brown and break off easily, the tree greater fire risk. Keep your tree base holder filled with water at all times. Place your tree away from fire ace, radiator and other heat source Be sure it doesn't block a doorway

 Don't cut or damage wire insula-tion when installing decorative light ings. "Throw away gift wrappings im

mediately. Don't burn them in the fireplace. They can ignite suddenly and cause a flash fire. Burning evergreens in a fireplace is also danger-ous-they can cause flames to flare out of control and send sparks flying around a room.

*Equip your home with UL Listed amoke detectors and an ABC-type fire extinguisher. They make good stock-ing stuffers.

Nearly one in five of the people you'll see around the table at holiday dinners could face special risks from food poisoning. People over 65, preg-nant women, infants and people with chronic illnesses all stand a greater chance of getting sick from food poi-soning and suffering complications. Here's some precautions you can take for safe holiday food:

*Don't thaw a frozen turkey on the kitchen counter. Thaw in the re-frigerator or microwave oven. Cook


*Snacking off the turkey is fine, but don't leave it out more than two hoursbacteria growth can double every 20 minutes under the right conditions.

•To speed cooling, debone the turkey and refrigerate it in small, shallow containers. Storing wings and legs intact is okay.

Don't cook turkeys overnight at low temperatures—they help bacte-ria grow. Cook at 325 degrees F.
Cook custards to 160 degrees F and refrigerate pies made with eggs.

Don't use a raw eggnog recipe.
Use commercially prepared, pasteurized eggnog or make your own with a cooked custard base.





Healthy Holiday Recipes

"Start the New Year off right by making a resolution to improve your

diet," he says. The family favorites can still be healthy dishes with just a few adjust-

- Try serving chicken grilled or barbecued instead of fried and remember to remove the skin. • For lasagna and other Italian dishes, use low-fat cottage cheese
- instead of ricotta cheese.
- Instead of ricotta cheese. Prepare those popular dips with low-fat yogurt instead of sour cream. Or make your own with plain low-fat yogurt and curry, or dill and dried onion or dry vegtable soup mix.
- Serve a big salad with lots of raw vegetables, beans or bean sprouts. Serve with reduced calorie dressing, lemon or vinegar on the side. Try an attractive and appetizing fruit salad.
- Offer a great-tasting fruit sorbet for dessert. Just place fruit, water and sugar in a blender and puree,

Try refreshing non-alcoholic drinks by mixing orange or cran-berry juice with seltzer water and garnish with a slice of lime. Try your hand at making a healthy, homemade bread with this recipe for cranberry bread.

Cranberry Bread

- 1 C. whole wheat flour
- 1 1/4 C. all-purpose flour 2/3 C. sugar
- 2 tsp. baking powder 1/2 tsp. baking soda 1/2 tsp. salt

- 2 tsp. sant 2 tsp. grated orange rind 3/4 C. orange juice 1 egg (or 2 egg whites) 2 Tbsp. vegetable oil 1 1/2 C. cranberries
- Sift together dry ingredients. Stir in orange rind. In separate bowl mix together orange juice, egg, and oil. Add to dry ingredients and mix just to moisten. Fold in cran-berries. Lightly grease bottom of 9"x5"x3" loaf pan. Pour batter in pan and bake in 350 degree F. oven 55-60 minutes or until cake tester comes out clean. Remove from pan and cool.

Yields 1 16-slice loaf at 120 calories, 2 gm fiber and 2 gm fat per slice; 15% of calories from fat.

So he would most likely be assessed a further modest premium for his ability to shake, when he laughs, "like a bowl-

ful of jelly." When Santa's smoking is considered, the underwriting cloud clears, even for the pipesmoking Santa. At Northwestern, only cigarette smoking is considered in underwriting. Northwestern Mutual underwriters

point out, however, that in the final analysis, it would be almost impossible to determine how much to charge Santa Claus for life insurance. Life insurance rates are based on the age of the insured. And Santa Claus is, after all, ageless

Her name is Dr. Laura Virginia Douglas and this Christ-mas she's playing Santa Claus not only to her pupils but her own daughter. Pink-cheeked, vivacious, yet shy and hesitant in speaking of personal matters, Dr. Douglas is not in favor of breaking the news boldly to a child that there is no Santa Claus. When she first became old enough to realize the full meaning of the Sun's editorial, she felt badly because poor children were not able to have Christmas gifts as tangible evidence of Santa's existence.
