With CCC grain stocks practically out of the picture, farmers may want to plan their overall marketing operations accordingly. The U. S. Department of Agri-culture recently announced that CCC has sold or earmarked for special use all of its corn and wheat and has only small stocks of barley, rye and sorghums.
