Cagle, left Thursday of last week for service in the U. S. Army. They reported to Abilene and will be sent from there to Fort Polk, Louisiana.

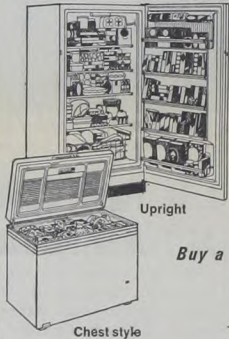

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Time Is Right To Kill Weed Pests

The time is right for growers to get a jump on those perennial weed pests—the woollyleaf bursage (lakeweed) and johnsongrass, says

Dr. Robert B. Metzger, area agronomist - cotton, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

With adequate moisture and warmer temperatures, the weeds are making rapid headway in cotton and other crops, he reports. "MSMA, sold under such trade names as Ansar or Daconate, will

effectively control lakeweed and johnsongrass," the area specialist advises. "Ansar 529 is sold as a jug mixture containing a surfactant. Growers can apply one and a half quarts per acre if weeds are actively growing. But if weeds are moisture stressed, the rates should be increased to two quarts using 20 to 40 gallons of water per acre. "Best results are obtained during open, sunny weather when the air temperature is 70° F or higher. Growers should not deep-break to control lakeweed. Cutting roots and shoots into smaller pieces often aids in further spread of this weed," he warns.

Says Metzger, "These perennial weeds will have to be sprayed to be effectively controlled. MSMA may be applied ahead of cotton planting, and after the cotton is three inches tall, a directed spray should be used."

The agronomist advises against applying over the top of plants or using MSMA after cotton begins to fruit.

"MSMA also is effective on other broadleaf weeds and grasses," he says, "such as cocklebur, volunteer sorghum, sandbur and nutgrass, but gives poor control of

carelessweeds."

To get around this problem, he advises, MSMA may be mixed with such herbicides as Karmex and Caparol to control these and other weeds.

"Another perennial weed, the Texas blueweed, can be controlled in cotton only by cultivation and hoeing since no effective herbicide is available," he adds. "In fields heavily infested with blueweed, producers could rotate to grain sorghum and use Banvel D or 2, 4-D. However, they should make sure no sensitive crop such as cotton or soybeans are nearby.

"Controlling weeds before they mature is essential," Metzger emphasizes, "in getting best results from herbicides or cultivation."

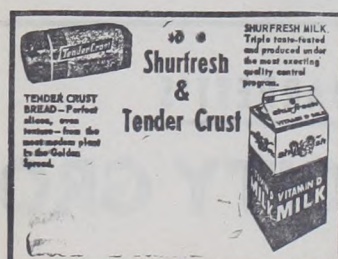

Pressure Cooker

Testing Clinics To Be Held In County

You are invited to bring your pressure cooker for testing Tuesday, June 12. The testing will be done in Silvertown at the Home Economics Department of the Silvertown School from 9:00 until 11:30 a.m. Testing will be done in Quitaque at the First United Methodist Church from 1:00 until 4:00 p.m.

Have you had the problem of spoilage of home canned foods? It is possible your pressure cooker may not be accurate. Pressure cooker manufacturers recommend that the cookers be tested yearly to insure accuracy.

An adjustment needs to be made for the altitude. For each 1,000 feet above sea level, add one minute to processing time if the time called for is 20 minutes or less. If the processing time called for is more than 20 minutes, add two minutes for each 1,000 feet. Since the local altitude is about 3,300 feet, the adjustment would be from three to six minutes.

Free literature on food preservation will be available at the testing clinics.

Education programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people regardless of socio-economic levels, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

Bedford Forrest, a farm broadcaster for KVII-TV in Amarillo, and an avid supporter of 4-H Club work in the Texas Panhandle, is being recognized for his contributions to 4-H.

He will receive a special plaque from the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation during the first general assembly of the 1973 State 4-H Roundup at Texas A&M University on June 5.

Forrest is one of 10 individuals, businesses and organizations to be

Forrest, a former 4-H'er, is a member of the 4-H sub-committee in Potter County and a project leader in public speaking. He has also been instrumental in planning campaigns and securing funds for the new Texas 4-H Center.

The farm broadcaster travels more than 50,000 miles each year to report about agricultural and related events in the Panhandle. He spends about 60% of his time reporting on activities of the Extension Service and 4-H.

In 1971 Forrest received the Texas Farmer's Union "Broadcaster of the Year" award.
