Quitaque City Council Has **Regular Meeting Monday**

Monday, August 12, 1996 the Quitaque City Council met in regular session at 5:30 p.m. with all council members present as well as City Secretary, Maria Cruz, Mayor Jim Davidson and Robert Patrick, City Manager. Also meeting with the group were Gordon Maddox, Kevin and Rita Moseley, Bob Hinkle and Mary

Mr. Maddox, Kevin and Rita Moseley discussed audits with the council.

Mary Baez presented the council with information on rate reviews. No action was taken in this matter.

Bob Hinkle, representing the Lions Club of Quitaque requested the council's approval to build a monument for "Veterans and Veterans Killed In Action" at the Quitaque Community Center. The council approved the request which will be

financed by the Lions Club. In the Caprock Public Library report it was stated that 425 patrons used the library with 500 books in circulation, 38 audio; 37 video; 16 inter-library loans; 3 large print and 7 reference questions. Ten new borrower cards were issued. This presents a gain from 1995 when there were 292 patrons and only 334 books in circulation.

City Manager Robert Patrick reported that he had met with the Briscoe County Commissioners Court and requested a pump for one of the fire trucks. The Commissioners Court is giving the request consideration.

Total ambulance runs reported for July were four. Nineteen students were reported to have attended the Incident Command Class sponsored by Texas Forest Service which provided nine hours of continuing education for all attending.

The Turkey EMS **Purchase Heart** Defibrillator

The Turkey EMS recently purchased a lifesaving heart defibrillator. The defibrillator, which cost over \$6,000, was paid for by a grant from the Cogdell Foundation and by local donations and activities sponsored by the Fire Department, such as their hamburger cook-out. Ninety percent of the cost came from the Cogdell Foundation.

According to the American Heart Association over 250,000 Americans who suffer cardiac arrest each year die before reaching a hospital. Use of a defibrillator by rescue workers in the field can more than double the chance of survival for a vic-

Defibrillators revive victims of cardiac arrest by shocking the heart back into a regular rhythm. Thousands of Texas residents, especially those located in suburban and rural areas, do not have access to this equipment because volunteer EMS units do not have the funds needed to

purchase this vital equipment.

The Turkey EMS are quite thankful for the support and the donations the citizens of Turkey have given.

A school was held in Quitaque to train the EMS on how to use the defibrillator. The instructor was Anthony Kingery and it was for the EMS in this area, Silverton, Flomot, Quitaque and Turkey. Those attending from Turkey were Ginger Morgan, Don Turner, Travis Carnes, Jim Weeks, Russ Yates and Steve Farley.

Quitague Hosts Incident Command Seminar

The City of Quitaque hosted an Incident Command Seminar presented by the Texas Forest Service. The seminar was held Friday, 7 p.m. until 10 p.m. and Saturday, 9 a.m. until 3 p.m., July 26 and 27th. The seminar instructors were Charles (Boo) Walker and Bill Spenser, both firefighters with the Texas Forest Service. Mr. Walker has been fighting fires for many years including fires covering 350,000 acres. He has fought fire all over the United States as well as, St. Thomas and St. Croix hurricane disasters. He has been the Incident Commander of groups of firefighters so large they numbered more than any community in the counties they were work-

The purpose of this seminar was to help the emergency personnel prepare and organize resources in the event of any major incident, whether it be a fire, tornado, or traffic accident. The group learned how to make the most of whatever they have available and how to get more

help here under organized and efficient conditions.

The seminar was attended by Quitaque EMS, Quitaque volunteer Fire Department, Tur-key Ambulance Service, and Caprock Canyons State Park per sonnel.

An incident was created on paper for them to organize. The instructors had radios and telephones for communication with the personnel who was divided into groups to control a fire. A fire similar to the large fire that raged here this summer was the test. After a confused start they were given two minutes to survey the work and re-organize. After getting off to a better start the next time, they were able to get the "fire" under control with no casualities and no improved properties destroyed. The group found out how much the seminaar could improve their effectiveness if or when another incident presents itself.

This was a very good learning experince for all present and will give the groups the confidence and knowledge to better control anything in the future.

A full house of students and school patrons was on hand at the school auditorium Monday morning as the local schools were integrated smoothly and without incident.

Supt. Johnny Mason welcomed old students and faculty, new students and new faculty members and friends to the beginning of a new school term that many feel will be one of the more successful in the school's history.

Seventy-six high school and 167 students in the elementary grades for a total of 243 were enrolled as of Tuesday morning, according to Supt. Mason. Last year 234 enrolled during the opening days of school.

Twelve students from Frederick Douglas School have enrolled in the lower grades and six have registered in high school.

After the invocation by the Rev. Kenneth Metzger and a sing-song led by the Rev. Roy Davidson, Mr. Mason introduced the faculty to the students and patrons present. 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
